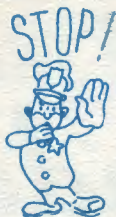


## SUNDAY, MAY 9 CHRISTIAN HOME SUNDAY

## RENOVATION BULLETIN — NO. 1

It will be the purpose of the Renovation Committee and the Finance Committee to issue bulletins at various times to keep you informed about the renovation of the Church School Building here at United Evangelical Church. We know you are interested and we want to keep you informed.

### I. PROGRESS TO DATE (MAY 1)

We should first like to note - for those of you who have previously indicated your desire to purchase a bond - that we have received the bonds from the printers and they are now being distributed.

As of the present the contracts for the repointing of the exterior walls of the Church School Building and the recaulking of all the joints at the windows, etc., and the complete repairing of the roof of the building have been let, in the amount of \$6,300.00 approximately.

### II. PLANS FORMULATING

We have been working on bids for other necessary parts of the renovation program and are ready to let bids as soon as it seems feasible. In round figures this is what the various segments will probably cost -

Studding and paneling of inside walls	\$2,800.00
Electrical work	\$2,900.00
Floor tile	\$2,500.00
Painting of interior, exterior of bldg.	\$3,700.00
Acoustical ceilings	\$2,500.00
Cement floor in auditorium(gym)	\$1,700.00
Air conditioners	\$ 780.00

(Work on additional heating units, necessary plumbing work, cost of certain equipments have not been ascertained as yet)

### III. FINANCES

As it looks now, the complete job will cost us in the neighborhood of \$30,000.00. As you know the only two ways we have of meeting these necessary financial costs is through the placing of Renovation Bonds with the friends and members of the congregation, and the receiving of out-right cash gifts to our Renovation Fund.

At the present, approximately \$6300.00 has been received in bonds, and \$800.00 in cash gifts. As this denotes, we must still go a long way to completely underwrite this program.

Any assistance you can give your church in this project will be greatly appreciated. We provide the form below for your convenience.
