CONFIRMATION FACTS

Because many are undoubtedly concerned about Confirmation for their children this fall, it is well to refer to it now.

1. The first session will be on Saturday, Sept.15 at 9 a.m. in

Friendship Hall.

2. Parents entering children should contact the Pastor before registration on Sept. 15th.

3. It is a one year course, and, if possible, all sessions will be held on Saturday mornings

- 4. Confirmation leads to membership with this church, and no parent should enroll a young man or woman whom the parent does not desire to remain constant at our church after Confirmation as an active member.
- 5. Class members should either e entering 8th grade this Sept. or have attained the age of 13 to be eligible for registration.
- 6. The cost of materials for the class will approximate \$3.50 which cost is born by the parents unless financially unable, whereupon the church meets the cost.

MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE

A pamphlet rack has been installed in the narthex of the church and carries current pamphlets of great interest. These are provided at the cost of 5¢ each unless otherwise noted. Also appre ciation is expressed to all who made the 'coffee hours' following the Lenten services such a success.

The financial records of the church indicate that \$1795.29 was received through the Dime Folders thus far, which funds are being used for the purchase of needed equipment for our church plant. The World Service envelopes (One Great Hour of Sharing) resulted in \$334.80. The Council sincerely thanks all who contributed to these funds, over and above their regular giving. If any have not as yet returned the Lenten Dime Folder or the bright red "One Great Hour" envelope, it is never to late to so do.

Baptisms will continue on the 3rd Sundays during the summer.

Remember that our sanctuary

is fully air-conditioned. Irregardless of how hot and himid the temperature may get, it will alway be comfortable in God's House.
