### ADVENT - A TIME OF PREPARATION

We need time to prepare for the coming of Christmas in a spiritual manner as well as in gift-buying and home decorations. Our hearts can be so encumbered with any number of worldly concerns and burdens that the mysterious and wonderful sense of Christ coming to us anew may never be apprehended in our in-

This would be tragic, for without this, Christmas is but a pagan holiday. Even though we have a Christ mas tradition in our lives, this holiness of Christ's birth may e lude us altogether. And then, how sad our state would be.

As we use the Lenten season as a preparatory season for Good Friday and Easter, so it is our purpose to use the four weeks prior to Christmas, called Advent, as a time of preparation. It is not extra services and events which we merely add to an otherwise busy schedule at the church, but necessary steps to the preparation of the human heart for the indwelling spirit of God through His only begotten Son. So, read carefully the wonderful events planned during this Advent and participate to the full so that your preparation may also be complete.

ADVENT CEREMONIALS

NUSIC, MESSAGES

AT 10:15 A.M. SERVICES

Each Sunday, in our Advent ceremonials, we shall move closer to Christmas in our preparation. All these ceremonials will take place at the 10:15 a.m. service, the 8:00 a.m. services being preaching servi ces(On Dec. 2nd, the early service begins at 7:45 a.m. due to Communion in that service, not the later)

To follow these ceremonials from Sunday to Sunday, to witness our lovely sanctuary assume the Advent and Christmas decorations, to hear the messages of Advent from pulpit and the choirs - this is your opportunity by regular attendances dur-Advent.

### TINSEL DAY -

Our second Tinsel Day is scheduled for Sunday, Dec. 16th. This all day observance at the church gives us as individuals and as families the opportunity of "getting in the Christmas spirit" through the decorations of the Christmas trees in the sanctuary and our Church School departments; through the fellowship meal we will eat together; through the Vesper "birthday for Jesus" par ty and service. We sincerely urge

even more of our larger family to spend the day at the church that Sunday. We suggest that parents of boys and girls attending our Sunday Church School, but which parents are not a part of our fellowship, come with their sons or daughters this day and discover what a fine fellow ship we have here, and become acquainted with their child's church.

Come for the morning service, or if you cannot come then, come at the noon hour for the 'carry-in din ner' and remain for the afternoon's activities. For all who can come to the service, bring your food dishes to church as you come and place same in kitchen, where women will be stationed to take care of these eatables.

The schedule for the day is as

follows:

12:00 noon - carry-in dinner in Friendship Hall, with food being placed on tables and all securing their food from these tables.

1:30 p.m. - the trimming of the trees in the sanctuary and all departments of the Church School by the youth and leaders for the sanctuary, and the teachers and pupils in the departments.

During this activity by the youth and children, the adults will have a Christmas Workshop, at which they can make decortions for the home fireplace, table, etc.

3:30 p.m. - Tinsel Day Program in Friendship Hall. All members of families, all present will gather for the singing of carols, a Christ mas film, and the closing Vespers and the "birthday cake for Jesus," after which we will have refreshments and dismissal.

To expedite the events of the day, please note and cooperate in the following:

Meat, bread, butter, beverage and a green salad will be provided for the dinner. Families, or individual members are requested to bring a covered dish(casserole or vegetable, potato salad or family favorite dish) Dessert provided.
