LENT

Lent is that penitential season of the church year consisting of 40 days before Easter, not including Sundays. The season begins with Ash Wednesday and through many centuries, especially in those denomin ations which are closest to the Reformation, has been observed as season of deep contemplation and soul-searching. The season ends on Good Friday at 3 p.m., the hour of Jesus' burial. It is sometimes called the quadrigesimal fast. Because in this season we give special attention to the Passion and Suffering of Our Lord and Master, it is a most solemn season in the church. Not only are special services held on Wednesdays at 8 in the sanctuary, but the spirit in the meetings of organizations during this period is subdued as regards programming events.

Lent is thought to have had its origin in a desire to commemorate our Lord's 40 days of fasting in the wilderness and His temptation by Satan. At first it lasted only 40 hours, the length of time our Lord lay in the tomb, and was a voluntary fast. In time it developed into a prescribed fast period and was observed by Christians generally. About the year 500 the dura-

tion of the period was extended to 36 days and in the 6th century the period was increased to the present 40 days.

Among many Protestant groups, our own included, the feature of fasting has been eliminated. Fasting as a religious practise never was followed too strictly in the Protestant tradition. As stated in Baker's Dictionary of Theology: "Christian history gives ample evidence of the abuse as well as the proper use of fasting...... In reaction against the perversion, the evangelical churches have been tempted to rem-

edy the abuse by discontinuing the

practise altogether."



LENTEN HOME DEVOTION PERIODS

PASTOR'S REPORT TO CONGREGATION

Report on Attendances, Pastoral Ser vices -

127 services conducted on Sundays and special occasions, includ-

ing Advent and Lent.

Average of attendance - for all Sunday services of the year, save for July and August, the average at tendance per Sunday was 481; for all Sunday services, 445. This represents about 46% of our congregation. Some may consider this a good average for a metropolitan church, but the pastor is aware of the large number who are very irregular and who need to realize that the first responsibility of membership is to be present at the services of worship. Even before give time to Sunday School classes, we should give time for the services of worship.

Attendance at the Sacrament was at the figure of 3317 for the year, and the average attendance at each Communion, excluding Holy Week and Easter, was between 150 and 200. Out of the more than 1000 members on the roll, this figure again in-dicates that many still follow the outdated custom of only coming to Holy Communion once a year (The pastor recommended at this meeting that we have the Sacrament at both rather services each 1st Sunday than to alternate between the services. This recommendation was accepted.)

Pastoral services - Weddings, 72; Baptisms, 65; Funerals, 56. Membership statistics in January Endeavor.

Progress made on Benevolent Giving A measuring rod of our stewardship is in the results achieved in benevelent giving across the year. Your Council and Finance officers have labored diligently in seeking to complete the challenges which are given us from our denomination in the benevolent field, or, to assist the work of our denomination in the world-wide mission of the church. These challenges have come to us in three categories, each for a distinct purpose.

The Apportionment - this is

the support we give the work of our denomination in terms of the general world-mission (missions, evangelism, Christian Education, higher ed ucation, etc.) On the basis of our membership our minimum asking in 1962 was \$8166.00. Though we achieved a higher percentage paid than in former years, we were only able to send in \$6000.00.

World Service - the challenge to contribute to the relief of suffering in a war-torn world - food, clothing, implements, rehabilita-tion, etc. - which we seek to gath-er in two "One Hour of Sharing" offerings in Lent and October. Asked to gather \$965.00 for this, we were able to gather \$760.00, a figure less than the asking. May we do better this new year.

Seminary Fund - a special ask-of something over \$2.00 per ing member across a number of years, this Seminary Fund is to provide needed help to our Seminaries (where young men and women are trained to become ministers and Directors of Christian Education) in the time of rising prices. Requested to give \$2763.00 for this, we sent in over \$2000.00 in this one year and will complete this asking in 1963.

90th Anniversary of Congregation In September we celebrate 90th birthday of our beloved United Evangelical Church. It is proper that we look forward to a wonderful celebration. Your paster requested the congregation to approve the set ting up of plans for this anniversary and to authorize the president to appoint an Anniversary Committee which would be made up of representatives of the church council, the organizations and the congregation at large. This was voted favorably.

Other Items

The congregation approved the setting up of a membership Campaign in our organizations from Lent to Pentecost(Feb. 27-June 2) This decision was given body at a recent meeting of representatives of organ izations, and will begin Ash Wednes

The proposed Constitution of the church received its third public reading and final adjusting and was then voted into force. The Constitution will now go to the printers and then be distributed to all members.

The pastor suggested some items for those who may desire to make special gifts or memorials to the church -

a)additional altar, pulpit and

lectern antependia in the red and colors - costing approximately in the neighborhood of \$300.00 for each set.

b)additional "stops" for our organ, ie, oboe, vox celeste and vo humana - at about \$750.00 to \$800.

c)a system of dimmers for the sanctuary lights, which would permit us to get various phases of lighting in the sanctuary, at a total cost of about \$900.00.

Thus to many of us a birth day cake is part and parcel of a birthday celebration, and the 4th of July still seems strange without fireworks. In the same way, a discipline or adjunct to the Lenten period is the Self-Denial Dime Fold er, which is for your family use from Ash Wednesday to Easter. It is the hope that each member of your family will participate in the fill ing of same as a family project. Just as the 4th of July is greater in meaning than fireworks, so the Lenten season is much richer in spiritual meaning than this fundgathering contrivance, but the Fold er does us an excellent opportunity as a family to practise a bit of self-denial in our everyday life. Let the dimes put in the folder represent the denial of something - ice cream, cigarettes, sodapop or some ether extraneous item you can do without. Thus the filling of the folder becomes meaningful. request that these folders be turned to the church on Good Friday or on Easter.
