# EASTER CHRISTIANS

This phrase may bring to mind the oft-quoted pun concerning that brand of Christian who only frequents the House of God at the Holy Week-Easter season. This interpretation of the Christian discipline and walk is to be critized on the part of any who have so watered down their faith.

But there are other Christians, conscientious participants in all aspects of the Christian life in the church, whose faith has never matured beyond the "Kaster bunny and egg" stage, or, in other words, has not grown beyond what could be said to be at best an immature interpretation of the faith. To these, Kaster is a glorious time, a time of rejoicing and church-going, a time when one is most certain to attend the Sacrament of Holy Communion - but why this is a glorious time is not too clearly known. They are aware that Kaster has something to do with Christ's Resurrection, but the connection is a bit hazy to them, good and faithful folk though they be.

Easter is a glorious, a joyous

time. It has to do with Christ's Resurrection. In fact, it is the Resurrection which is the whele con tend of the Christian Easter. The Passion and Suffering and death of Jesus, which we observe in Lent, is climaxed by His miraculous resurrec tion from the dead, the conquering of the power of death over the soul of the child of God. Because of the resurrection we have not to fear the besting of our souls in eternity by the Devil. We have the promise of Heaven with God for all who truly love the Lord and fellew Him throughout life. But, de you see, this resurrection also gives us a strength throughout life, not only a final strength. Because our Christ conquered death and sin, we tee can have strength to be strong against sin and temptation in life. "Thanks be unto God who giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

We need to be Easter Christians, not to dwell upon the decorations and customs, not to frequent the House of God only then, but te live day by day in the glorious faith and victory which Easter gives us.
