Pentecost

Pentecost is not an insignificant event in the Christian Church Year, but equally important with the Incarnation, the Crucifixion and the Resurrection. For in Pentecost we commemorate the third manifestation of God's goodness unto man in the sending of Himself in the person of the Holy Spirit. We use the term "person" but we do not thereby partition God. God in His fullness came unto man and remains present with man in the Holy Spirit just as God in His fullness came to earth in the "person" of Jesus our Lord, and, God in His fullness manifested Himself and still does as God the Father, creator and sustain of mankind and all of God's uniferse.

Sometimes it is asked why the Holy Spirit did not come until Pentecost? Donald G. Miller in his book "The People of God" gives this answer: "Was not the Holy Spirit in existence before Pentecost? And if existent, was he not at work in the world? The answer to both questions is, Yes. The Holy Spirit was very much alive and very active be-fore Pentecost. We are told in the Gospel story that at Jesus' baptism the Holy Spirit descended upon him. But Jesus could not impart the Holy Spirit to his church until he had fully overcome that which separated man from God. Until Jesus died and rose again and ascended to the Fath er, the breach between God and man could not be overcome. But then the risen Lord carried our humanity up into the God-head. Now God and man

again were one. It was therefore possible for Jesus to give to man the gift of restored harmony. At Pentecost, this is exactly what hap pened. The God-man brought the restored unity between God and man to the life of his church."

Thus Pentecost is very important and the coming of the Holy Spirit is very important to the whole purpose of the church and the disciple ship of all Christians. The church calls you to this continuous disciples.
