God has blessed United Evangelical Church so richly we can celebrate the 90th anniversary of our founding this September. Two special Sundays, and a Saturday night banquet-dance are being arranged to heighten our joy and to be the avenues of our jubilation. We are expectant that our entire church family will participate to the full in all these activities.

This Sunday will also be the "Re consecration Sunday," the "Back to Church Sunday" after our period of vacations, when we urge all to return to this our spiritual home. Two services, at 7:45 and 10:15 a.m., with the Sacrament of Holy Communion at each service, will include the anniversary message from the pulpit, the return of our fall and winter Order of Service, the presence of our choirs singing special anniversary anthems. Also, at the 10:15 a.m. service we shall have the privilege of dedicating a beautiful set of red altar and lectern paraments.

2ND ANNIVERSARY SUNDAY, SEPT. 22nd (only a 10 a.m.service; S.S.,8:45)

This is the Sunday nearest the actual day of organization, back in 1873, and becomes the climax of our anniversary.

The big anniversary service is 10 a.m. (no 8 a.m. service) and will

bring us as our anniversary speaker an executive of our denomination, Dr. Edward L. Schlingman of Philadelphia, who was born here in the Canton area of Baltimore, was baptized at United Church and grew up in Baltimore city. In addition to other special features for the service, the Anniversary Book will be distributed at this time. This memento of the 90th anniversary will contain a history of the church and the story of our anniversary. It will not be available until this service.

SUNDAY SCHOOL INTRODUCING NEW CURRICULUM

With this fall our Sunday School will begin using the United Church of Christ Curriculum, just being in troduced by our denomination.

This curriculum is based upon the "semester" plan of teaching, and units for the 2 semesters of the year each consume 5 months with a brief unit of work for July & Aug. Departmentally the units are set up for 2 yr. age spans, thus creating two new departments in our total school. The curriculum, further, is based upon a central theme for each semester and is set on a 2 yr. cycle. The three major themes for the first year are: "Growing As A Christian: Exploring Our Christian Heritage; Christians Living With Each Other."

Thus, as we begin our work in Christian Education this fall, we will reorganize our Sunday School to meet the needs of the new curriculum - instituting the new departments, changing the meeting place of some departments, shifting pupils into these departments, It may take a Sunday or two to get all phases of the new program functioning smoothly, but we are confident we shall have a finer Sunday School through it all.
