Further, it is our purpose to paint the sanctuary immediately after Easter, together with the halls leading thereto. For this we need a fund of some \$3000.00, which we do not want to take from our regular resources, but would desire to receive through special gifts, eith er as direct gifts to the Paint The Church Fund, or in the form of memorials, stipulated thusly.

Thirdly, we secure the lovely lilies on our Easter altar through the graciousness of our people in donating to the Lily Fund or making memorial gifts to this Fund.

We place these matters into your attention, asking that you remember your church in these special ways at Easter, together with your extra Easter gift through the regular envelopes. And we thank you aforehand for your response.

PASTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

(By vote at the annual meeting the reproduction of this report was ordered in this issue of the paper. It appears in abbreviated form)

"In gratitude to God we would re view the past year and look into the unknown future....We can report services were held on each Lord's Day and at special seasons.....For all Sunday services of the year, the average attendance was 437 per Sunday, a figure which reveals that a fair representation of our member-ship have not followed assiduously the desire of our Lord that we present ourselves very regularly in the House of God for the services ofwor ship.....We need to continue pressing home the admonition that regularity of attendance at the services of worship is the first responsibility of a Christian Church member.

Other statistics for 1963 areweddings, 75; baptisms, 51; funerals, 65, of which 24 were members. 9 were confirmed, 28 adults were re

ceived into membership, making a to tal of 37 additions. Removals from membership were: by death, 24; by deletion, 17; transfer out, 18; com mended but not transferred out, 14. Our total membership dropped from 1048 to 1012, a net loss of 36. Nearly half this net loss is due to the study of our membership records by the Spiritual Committee and the Church Council as ordered by our Constitution and represents a begin ning of the cleaning up of our files to bring these files into a very current condition, removing all such names of those who have no fur ther interest in the church. process has just gotten started and will bring further results. Our Constitution says that any one who has been inactive for 2 or more yrs and shows no interest or does not react to letters of admonition from the Council, is to be deleted from membership. This action is not tak en heartlessly but only after all attempts to reinstate the individual or family fail

The financial records shows we have pretty well met our budget locally and have made big strides for ward in our benevolent contribu-tions as a church in 1963. We have not achieved the total goals given us by our Synod and denomination as well as local denominational mission ventures. Our total benevolent giving for 1963 approximates nearly 25% of our total income, which is a commendable percentage. We still need to strive to the goal that each member of the church be an envelope contributing member, that our continuous stewardship plan be that of advocating percentage or proportionate giving. Tho not all our folk are seemingly plac ing their voluntary giving on this Scriptural basis, your pastor feels that many have prayerfully adopted this approach, and commends them for the same, and admonishes others to do likewise. May more of our folk in 1964 and beyond look at their giving to the church as being that percentage of total earnings which is taken off the top of the pay check, as cream is taken off the top of a bottle of milk, rather than being the money one has left over when all commitments have been The word of God through His met. Church is important enough to receive first place in our lives.....
Through the efforts of Council

and our people we were able to paint the gym (Auditorium) and the Friendship Hall, setting forth also a program looking to the refurnishing of our sanctuary in 1964. Also

through the contribution of our women we were able to provide the equipment whereby our sanctuary and chancel lights can be dimmed at will. We are grateful for this gift to the church.

Finally, during the year further steps of inquiry were taken to pro-vide an Interne from a Seminary, or some other like person to augment the staff and give assistance to the pastor. Nothing definite can be reported at this time, but defi-nite information should be forthcoming soon. The pastor is appreciative to Mr. William Laukeman, coming soon. one of our retired members, who has been serving as Parish Visitor and making certain visits under the Pas tor's direction. This has already proven a most worthwhile program and will be continued into this new Respectfully submitted,
