# COMMUNION PROCEDURE CHANGED

Beginning with the May Communion services the procedure of the Holy Communion will be changed. After considerable discussion, and coming from a definite recommendation of a Church Council committee, the Council voted to inaugurate this new system, placing in a position of greater importance, the service of the Sacrament.

Feeling that our members should be admonished and encouraged to more regular receive the Sacrament in a monthly manner, Council has request ed the Pastor to place the Sacrament as an integral part of the wor ship service, instead of an appendage to the service, as has been the former procedure. Thus we will observe the Holy Communion prior or before the sermon of the day. The liturgy of the service will be so arranged that we will endeavor to lift up the position of the sermon and Sacrament on Communion Sundays, eliminating certain liturgical features.

On these Sundays. that the service may flow smoothly, worshippers are requested to sit on the main floor of the sanctuary. Communion cards and attendance cards are to be prepared immediately upon entrance into the sanctuary and passed to the center aisle for collection early in the service. We will still come to the altar for the Sac rament, following the direction of the ushers. Those not attending (children not yet confirmed are not to commune) should remain in their place and permit the communicants to move to and from the altar. As we kneel to receive the Sacrament, at the direction of the pastor, let us place the hand as a cup into which the wafer can be placed rather than reach for it, and then extend the hand for the cup.

May we follow the admonition of our faith that we receive the Sacra ment regularly on the first Sunday of the month. Prior to the coming to the altar may each one offer a prayer of anticipation and when returning to the pew a prayer of thanksgiving for God's blessing and the forgiveness of sins.

While we are referring to changes being made, may we report that Memorials will henceforth be printed on the bulletin each Sunday. For the memorials to appear on a given Sunday, they must be received at the office by Wednesday before.

The early service is thought of primarily as a brief service of pray ers and sermon and not as a duplication of the later, fuller service

The lights are dimmed prior to each service to assist in the mood of meditation even as the organ music is soft. As you enter God's House, be in the attitude of reverence. And, do not leave God's Temple without a prayer on your heart.

# PAINTING PROCEEDING

At this writing, the painting of the sanctuary and surrounding halls and entrances is in progress. This is the first painting the new struc ture is receiving, the unpainted walls serving since dedication in 1957. If no barriers in the schedule appear, the job ought to be completed in early May. The cost of this improvement is

in excess of \$3000.00. The Church Council is expectant that the folk of the church will be bringing spec ial gifts toward the cost of this painting.
