PUT YOURSELF INTO THE CHURCH

In a recent devotional reading from "Today," the author invites us to sit down and calculate the cost of being builders together with Christ, of God's Kingdom. He states that too frequently the invitation to church membership is often so hearty it implies there are few strings attached to being a Christian, that there is little differ-%nce from joining a fraternal organ ization.

Is this right? Are there no strings attached to being a church member, being a Christian? Can we join the church without further thought of the Christian life, want ing to be a part but taking no responsibility for the job of building the Kingdom of God in our time?

Some may feel this way but they are wrong. We are all together builders with Christ, not primarily of a physical plant called a church but of a far more important spiritual structure, the Kingdom of God upon earth.

Are we ready to assume, in living and giving, what Christ demands The illustration at the head of this editorial carries a direct sermon. When we give our gifts to God's Church through our regular envelopes, we literally are giving ourselves. Think it over and see if this interpretation is not correct. We do not just give a monetary gift but it is us we give, a concentrated, consecrated portion of our every earning, not just a few coin or a bill or two, without thought. Our offering signifies each one of us crawling into every envelope and saying, "This is what I think of my church, this is the manifestion of my loyalty."

But putting yourself into the church is far more than an offering, as important as our voluntary gifts may be. The church wants you to do greater jobs of loyalty. Christ has other demands which we ought to ful fill besides the offerings we give. The demand for consecrated living from day to day is a very real one. Consecrated living is both an achievement and a gift of God. It is a gift of God in that we have no strength to approach consecration but by His grace. It is an achieve ment in that we much strive our-selves against worldliness or unrighteousness and callous living. As we put ourselves into the church by consecrated living and by allign ing ourselves with the philosophy of righteous living in all aspects, we will find ourselves becoming builders together with God of His Kingdom here on earth.

As we begin together another fall and winter season, this is a grand time for us to renew or continue the job of putting ourselves into the church.

YOU CAN HELP Build A Church

As you know, many new churches are being erected in the suburbs of our cities. These are churches of all kinds. Some of them are United Churches of Christ, new congregations being formed by our denomination. We, as a denomination, have been given the privilege of forming many more new congregations in mush rooming communities than we have been able to accomplish, chiefly be cause of the lack of funds.

A new congregation, usually a small group of people, has very lit tle prospect of putting up the kind of church ediface which would be in viting to others, that is, without help from other churches and folk of the same denomination in larger and well formed congregations, those who can do this kind of missionary work.

To share in the formation of a fund from which such new groups may secure money on loan, to be repaid into this revolving fund, is your privilege. Our Synod has organized a "Builder's Fund" and solicits a \$10.00 annual gift from you and/or your family. This is a small amount for most families but will go a long way in helping ease this problem. A fund of \$10,000.00 is anticipated. CONFIRMATION CLASS TO ORGANIZE

Confirmation Instruction will again be on Thursday nights, beginning Sept. 17. Classes will be held in Friendship Hall, with entrance off Dillon Street. All unconfirmed youth who are entering 8th grade or above, or who are 13 yrs of age, are expected to become part of this class. As of last year, all youth in the Confirmation Class are expect ed to become a part of the Youth Choir, for the work of the Youth Choir is beneficial in learning the liturgy and responses and practices of church worship. This is expected. Youth Choir will rehearse on Thursdays from 6:30 p.m. to 7:30, when Confirmation session begins.

Parents of class members are requested to meet with the Pastor on Thursday, Oct. 1st at 9 p.m., at the conclusion of the class session This meeting is for the purpose of getting to know each other, to set down the rules of the class and to explain the procedures of class work and the manner of parent cooperation which is expected.



VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL A SUCCESS

The 1964 School was held for 9 days(June 22-July 3) A pupil enroll ment of 82 made it the largest Bible School here in a number of years The staff of about 15 adults and youth functioned very smoothly and efficiently to make the school successful. Under the general theme, "God, My Country and I," the school made a fine impact in the presentation of our dual citizenship - in the Kingdom of God and as Americans An average attendance of 77 (including staff) for each of the days meant that better than half of our enrollment was here on the nine days. An offering of \$37.25 was de voted to the American Bible Society and will be used for the distribution of about 700 copies of the Ser mon on the Mount to the children of Asia. Appreciation is expressed to all who assisted in this excellent school.

WONDERFUL GIFTS TO CHURCH

During these summer months three splendid gifts were presented to the church, for which gratitude is expressed. 200 Pew Bibles(Revised Standard Version)were given in memory of John Lambert, Jr. by his wife Mrs. Cath. Lambert & children. These Bibles are in red binding, each one carrying the name of the church and are in each pew rack, to be used by worshippers for dovotional reading and during the service. A gift of audio-visual equipment was given in memory of Mr. John A. Friemiller by wife, Mrs. Helen Friemiller and the children. This equipment, to be housed in the pastor's office, will be used for Confirmation sessions and other group needs. It consists of a Viewlex slide and filmstrip projector and a Califone Director II Transcription player with variable speed control. The third gift is a beautiful drapery, with heavy lining, which hangs over the large memorial window at the rear of the Made from red nave of the church. ecclesiastical cloth to blend in with the rug color, this drapery is fireproofed. It will be open for the services but will be closed at other times, thus protect ing the furniture and equipment of the sanctuary from the intense sunlight which streams thru the large window. This drapery is a gift of our Young Women's Guild.

CRADLE ROLL DEPARTMENT EXPANDED

We are now seeking to bring even the very little ones into our fellowship in a very real way. This is through a very active Cradle Roll, under the direction of Mrs. George (Betty) Fischer.

When a baby is baptized, the name of the baby and its parents is given to Mrs. Fischer. As soon as possible an invitation is mailed to the family to enter the child on our Cradle Roll, the first division of our Church School. If the invitation is accepted, the child and family are sent periodic materials through the first 3 yrs. of life, and on the third birthday the parents are then invited to enter the child into the Nursery, the first 'attending' department of the School, with session at 9 a.m. on Sunday mornings.
