

G. A. Studdart Kennedy wrote a terrific poem years ago which tells the story of how folk treated Jesus at the time of His suffering and death on the cross, and of how they actually bodily mistreated our Lord to say nothing of the animosity they expressed toward Him.

In the second stanza the poet transfers Jesus' coming to Birming-ham instead of Jerusalem and says that today we probably would not mistreat the Lord, we would merely do nothing, we'd evade Him altoge-ther. Let us quote this second

stanza:

"When Jesus came to Birmingham

they simply passed him by, They never hurt a hair of him, they only let him die;

For men had grown more tender, and they would not give him pain They only just passed down the street, and left him in the rain We can substitute Baltimore for Birmingham and the season of Advent and Christmas for Good Friday, and find the message of personal reception. It is one thing to be over-come with the beauty of the Advent-Christmas season - - - the carols, Tinsel Day, Christmas lights and Christmas odors, and to leave the

Christ standing out in the rain (or snow), to not ever welcome Him into our hearts and homes.

Your church works very hard in planning to help you prevent this, to aid in bringing Christ into Advent-Christmas for each of you. But all the planning we do will not help you and your family unless you participate in the events of Advent and Christmas and thus capture the reason we observe this meaningful, lovely season - to permit the Lord to come to each of our hearts and be born anew in us as our Master, but also as our Judge and Mediator before God.

Don't let Jesus stand out in the rain (snow) of your thoughtlesness this Advent-Christmas season,

Nov. 29 - It was God's Time 6 - The Babe Discovered Dec. 13 - The Child Visited


Dec. 20 - The Baby Sought Dec. 27 - Old Year Sunday

Our 4th annual Tinsel Day on Sun day, Dec. 13 is a day of delight for family groups at United Evangel ical Church. We invite your family to join others in this wonderfu? day, or, if you have no family, we urge you to attend.

The festivities begin with the noon meal following the services. We will provide the meat, butter, bread beverage and salad. Families are re quested to bring a hot dish(s) of food of their own desire sufficient to feed their family. All will be

# CHURCH SCHOOL CHRISTMAS SERVICE SUNDAY, DECEMBER 20 10:15 A.M.

All departments of the Church School will attend the 10:15 a.m. service on this Sunday. Church School session will begin at 9:30 instead of the regular hour. At approximately 10 a.m. the departments will begin to march into the sanctuary and sit as department groups. The service is being planned to be of interest to all, the youth and adults. Also the regular 10:15 con gregation is urged to attend this service, for it will be a full worship service.

Featuring the music of our new Cherub Choir and the Youth Choir, the service also will include a brief dramatic Christmas message and a meditation by the Pastor

from the pulpit.

Following the service the depart ments can return to their meeting place for the giving of individual gifts and whatever festivities they desire. There will be no evening Christmas service for the Church School this year.

Envelope sets for 1965 will be ready by Sunday, Dec. 13 and can be secured following either service in Friendship Hall. Please remember, if you have not used the 1964 envelopes, none will be made up for you for the new year, but can be secured by individual application thru any Council member and by conversation with Pastor Rasche. It is the desire of the Church Council that each member of the church be an envelope contributor, but sets of envelopes are not automatically prepared for all but just for those who contribute through them. Other members can receive them by application.

We invite you to assist us in the preparation of baskets at the Christmas season by the contribution of staple foods and canned goods. May we have these no later than Sunday, Dec. 20th. Thank you.

The pastor stands ready to bring the Sacrament of Holy Communion to our shutins and sick early in the month of December. Since our Communion at church is on Dec. 6, it is fitting the Home Communions be requested also for early December. Requests are to be made directly to the church office.

#### WHITE GIFTS FOR 1964

Each Advent-Christmas season we at the church have been thinking of others whom our congregation can as sist. We have been bringing our "white gifts" for specific institutions and agencies of our larger church. This year Caroline Mission of St. Louis, Mo., is to be the recipient. Caroline Mission is a work of our denomination in the slum area of that city, carrying on church work and a Community Center. Thus we are inviting all who de-

sire (of the Church School and congregation) to bring in dolls, doll dresses, wash cloths, face soap, to-wels, and equipment for the maintenance of the Center Nursery. Do not individually wrap materials. They will be wrapped and packed on Tinsel Day (Dec. 13) These are not gifts particularly for Christmas but to assist throughout the future

#### SENIOR CITIZENS HOME SOON READY

The 1st location of our United Church Homes, Inc., is in Silver Springs, Md., and is known as Springvale Terrace. It will open for occupancy about Feb. 1, 1965 and will contain excellent facilities for Senior citizens.

A brochure of questions and answers concerning residency is available from the pastor, as are application forms. Here are answers to

some pertinent questions:

1. There are 124 units, with a capacity of 139 residents. Units are of 2 types: an efficiency unit of 1 room, private bath, with or without kitchenette, and, a 2 room apartment, with bed and living room plus bath and kitchenette.

2. Buildings are completely air-

conditioned.

3. Admission is primarily for res idents of Wash-Balto area who are 62 yrs of age, not gainfully employ

ed and in good health.

4. No admission fees, life-lease contracts or other payments over and above rent of rooms, food and the collateral services. Cost is approx. \$90-95 for single unit per month and \$115-120 for double units

If interested, contact the pastor who will further explain questions, provide application form and arrange for interview with the Director of Springvale Terrace.
