

WHICH JESUS DO YOU WANT ?

(The inspiration for this editorial came at one of our midweek services as I listened to Dr. Lehmanns sermon on the episode of Barabbas

in the Passion story of our Lord.)
None of us can get away from Jesus. Even the crowd at the trials
of Jesus had to choose between Jesus the Christ and Jesus Barabbas, for the official name of the condem hed man who pilate placed besides Jesus was also Jesus. So, the people had to decide which Jesus they preferred. They chose Jesus Barab-bas. He was set free. Jesus the Christ was condemned to death.

None of us can get away from Jesus. We all need to make a choice in our lives as to what god we want to follow - the God who is called the Christ, who gave His life as a ran-som for our sins and through whom we can have everlasting life orthe god of his world, representing status-quo; power of the clenched fist; domination by the things money can buy; the thrills and unnatural exhilerations of the life of sex, pleasure, dissipation. We are not all-sufficient, and need a god to which we give obedience and loyalty.

The crowds chose Jesus Barabbas and went on to commit sacrilege of the holy, inhumanities to fellow human, and murder of the innocent. Once Jesus Barabbas had been chosen as their Jesus, the other wrong choices followed, for the choices we make determine the direction our lives will take.

We come again to the close of a Lenten period and to each of us com es the question again, "Which Jesus do you want?" As we make the life choice may we remember the path of life which each choice opens before us. It is not merely a simple choice we make, but one which has tremendous influence upon our lives We can choose Jesus the Christ or Jesus Barabbas, Heaven or Hell, righteousness or unrighteousness, light or darkness, joy or sorrow.

Which Jesus will you choose? Rededicate your life to the Lord Jesus and thus let this Lenten season and the coming glorious Easter be a time of great spiritual worth for

PALM SUNDAY SERVICES APRIL 11



These services, at 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. begin with the traditional procession of "The Palms," even as the followers of the Lord carried Palms that first Palm Sunday and shouted their Hosannas. Each service will bring the Palm Sunday message by Pastor Rasche. The 10 a.m. service includes the Rite of Confirmation for those Confirmands who make the decision to follow the Christian way of life. At the conclusion, each worshipper will receive Palm branches to take home as a memento of the day.



EASTER SUNDAY IS APRIL 18

Beginning very early in the morning of Easter, we will assemble in our lovely lily-bedecked sanctuary for the 6 a.m. service, a full service with choral anthems, Scripture and the Easter message by the Pastor.

Then at 10 a.m. the Festival Easter service brings the features of the early service plus the Memorial Service and the dedication of the Memorial Easter Lily Altar.

At both hours on Easter the Sacra ment of Communion will be offered in a special Communion service beginning approximately 5 minutes after the regular services conclude. Following the benediction and recessional at each service those desiring the Sacrament are requested to fill the pews from the front first.

HOLY THURS.



The Sacrament will be in the body of the service this night of Thurs April 15th at 8 p.m., as is our cus tom. However it will be a different service, for we shall be using an order of service which follows

the movements of Christ on the night of betrayal and through the day of crucifixion.



For those able to be at a morning service, the Sacrament of Holy Communion is offered at a 9 a.m. service here in our sanctuary. Included in this service is a message for Good Friday from the pulpit.

THREE HOUR SERVICE

From noon to 3 p.m. the Community Three-Hour Good Friday Service will be held at Emmanuel Lutheran Ch., on Baltimore St. at Robinson. Pastors and choirs of community churches will participate. Composed of seven 25 minute segments, this service permits you to leave at any interlude or remain for the entire service.

TENEBRAE COMMUNION, 8 p.m.

Our Communion will be in the body of the service, which also includes a message from the pulpit and choral music. The service will be concluded with the service of Tenebrae (the lowering of the lights). This is a practice of the Christian Ch. coming from the Middle Ages, though not often used. In its Protestant version it brings the extinguishing of the candles at the altar, accompanied by solemn narration and music. The church finally is in total darkness, signifying the temporary extinguishing of the "light of the world" in the death of Jesus, the culmination of the Lenten season. In deep dimness the worshippers will be requested to depart from the sanctuary, keeping utter silence until out of the church building
