TRIUNE GOD

With Sunday, June 6, the season of Trinity in the Christian Church year, begins. Perchance you are wondering about the Christian teach ing concerning the three Persons of the Trinity. The shield of the Trinity can be of help in explaining this. This shield is one which comes from medieval days.

The eye in the center represents God, the "all-seeing eye," the ever present God. The hand to the upper left is the extended hand of God the Father; the Lamb with the flag to the right is the figure of the Christ, the Lamb of the world; the dove at the bottom is the emblem of the Holy Spirit, whose coming we celebrate on Pentecost Sunday, and which Holy Spirit is the spirit of God at work in the world and hearts of men now. The words are in Latin "est" meaning "is" and "non est"
meaning "is not."
This emblem can be read in any

direction to receive the truth of God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost. Beginning at the cenregiming at the center, we read the positive statement "God is the Father, the Father is God; God is the Son Jesus, the Son is God; God is the Holy Spirit, the Holy Spirit is God." Reading about the outside we then receive the message, "The Father is not the Son nor the Holy Spirit; the Son is

neither the Father nor the Holy Spirit; the holy Spirit is not the Father nor the Son," in other words each person of the Godhead has His own circle of responsibility.

All the momentous truths which we hold forth all the rest of the Christian year are gathered together in the teaching of the Trinity and this strong formula serves as a three-fold cord to bind them into a reality.

Take for example the teaching of Christmas - the union of the Divine and human in the Incarnated Son of God, Jesus Christ. It is the doctrine of the Eternal Godhead (Father Son and Holy Spirit) which keeps the eternal faith of the Savior's Divinity bright and clear. Disown the threeness of the Godhead and soon the teaching of Jesus' divini-ty becomes vague and thin. If the diety of Christ is denied, if He is only a creature, then the doctrine of the Atonement has no meaning.
