ACCORDING TO FAITH

We benefit spiritually by so doing. If we have practiced regularity, let us continue, for there is always spiritual want in our lives. Let us continue onward "according to the faith."

READ THIS IMPORTANT LETTER

Dear Fellow Church Member:

Your Church Council is pleased to report that the renovation of our Church School building is rapic ly nearing completion, and will be ready for the teaching of our newly expanded curriculum in the very near future. This fine facility in corporates the most modern teaching concepts and aids, and will enable United Evangelical Church to continue its traditional emphasis on the education of its young people and adults in the Christian principles.

However, as with all construction efforts today, the rebuilding
of our Church School facilities has
been a costly matter. In order to
finance the project, your Church
Council, pursuant to congregational
authority, has found it necessary
to incur obligations of nearly
\$30,000.00. This sum will be repay
able, to bond holders and to other
sources, over approximately a 5 yr.

period.

It will be impossible for this much money to be subtracted from the regular offerings and for there still to be sufficient funds available for the operation of the church. Therefore it is necessary for your Church Council to this earnest appeal for your gener-ous financial support of the Church School renovation work in addition to your usual contributions. You may make your donations by using regularly each month the Improvement Fund (Spiritual Building Fund) envelopes in your set of envelopes; or in the special envelopes found in the pew racks or in any other convenient manner. But, please, re member this vital work cannot be paid for without your support. Your Church Council is certain that you will respond to this appeal to the full extent of your financial ability as you have done in the past, and make this project a success.
