About 15 years ago Roy L. Smith wrote a Christmas article in our de nominational paper in which he told the story of one lad in the ship-ping room of a department store, watching another lad who was poking around in a big box filled with wads of wrapping paper. Inquisi-tively, the watcher asked the other, "What are you looking for?" to which the answer came, "We're minus one package and it may be lost in the wrappings." chance never experience the real Christmas because of the importance we give to the external elements of Christmas, slighting its spiritual content.

As we face the coming of another Advent season it is well that at the outset we vow we will not permit the tinsel, the busyness and the glamour of Christmas preparations and celebrations to rob us of the essence of Christmas, the worship of the only begotten Son of God,our Lord Christ, as a Christmas babe and as the Saviour of our immortal souls in life and at the last day.

Henry H. Tweedy of Yale Divinity School jotted down these lines some time in the past. I found them in my Christmas file and quote them here because of the manner in which they elucidate this same point:

On Christmas eve they filled the house, some fifty guests all told, (O little Lord of Christmas, were

you left out in the cold?) And ate and sang, played cards and danced till early morning light,

(O little Lord of Christmas, did they think of you that night?) Next morning came the presents on a glittering Christmas tree.

(O little Lord of Christmas, was

there any gift for thee?) The dinner was a Roman feast, and how those guests did eat! (0 little Lord of Christmas, were

you hungry in the street?)

Then came some teas, a movie, and at night the last revue,

(O little Lord of Christmas, what had these to do with you?)

By midnight all were tired and cross and tumbled into bed,

(O little Lord of Christmas, did they think that you were dead? They all woke up with headaches and no joy in work or play,

(O little Lord of Christmas, did they mark your birth that day?) The love, the joy were good no doubt; the rest a pagan spree, (O little Lord of Christmas, let.

us keep the day with Thee.)

ADVENT SUNDAYS

The new Christian Church year be gins with the season of Advent. Advent is that season wherein we prepare for Christ's coming, at Christ mas, and at the Last Time. It is a penitential season, thus we include the stanza of Confession in our ser vices.

Beginning with Sunday, Nov. 28 the Advent season not only brings messages by Pastor Rasche on the Ad vent epistles, and the beautiful music of Advent and Christmas from our hymnals and by the choirs but it also brings again the Advent cer emonials which have become traditional with us at United.

Our first ceremonial is the display of our lovely Italian Creche, or Manger scene, on Nov. 28. On Sunday, Dec. 5, the Advent and Christmas greens will be hung in the sanctuary during the 10:15 a.m. service, to be followed on Sunday, Dec. 12 by the hanging of the wreaths. The display of our beautifully trim med Christmas tree, together with the lovely poinsettia altar will transpire on Sunday, Dec. 19, in time for the special services of the day and of Christmas Eve.

It will be on Sunday, Dec. 19th, at the 10:15 a.m. hour that the Church School pupils will worship with us to enrich our lives by the special events of their annual Christmas service.

The heighth of all our preparations for Advent and Christmas will be achieved on Christmas Eve, when at 8 p.m. and 10:45 p.m. we shall have our two identical Christmas Eve Candlelighting services.

Holy Communion will be celebrated at the 7:45 a.m. and 10:15 a.m. services on Sunday, Dec. 5

CHRISTMAS EVE SERVICES 8 P.M. and 10:45 P.M.

Attendance at either one of the Christmas Eve Services should be a definite part of Christmas for all our families. Let us not become so unmindful of the real truth of this great day that we fail to place the presence in God's House in the very center of our observance.

Since each of these services is identical to the other, it matters not which one we attend. Each service is a candlelighting service, conducted in the glow of Christmas candles and the lights of the Christmas tree. Each service includes a message of Christmas from the pulpit and the glorious music of Christmas by our choirs. Each ser vice includes the Christmas offering wherein each child of God has the opportunity of bringing a love gift unto the Lord which is over and beyond our usual offerings. As of last year, each service will be proceeded by a beautiful "carol sing by our choral group from the balcony. Don't miss this beautiful spiritual experience.

The afternoon will close with the traditional little Christmas party and the "birthday cake" honoring our Lord Jesus. Festivities will be brought to a close with cof fee and a piece of cake.



CHURCH SCHOOL CHRISTMAS SERVICE SUNDAY, DECEMBER 19 10:15 A.M.
