THE "ENLISTMENT" COMING SOON.

Through these past months those attending the services of worship and receiving the Sunday bulletins have noticed a weekly paragraph on "Budget Information," giving data concerning our attendance at the services and the financial report on offerings. All have noted, if you read with discernment, that tho our attendances have not declined too badly for the summer months, we fail each Sunday to achieve the nec essary funds, by offerings, to meet our budget. The figure listed as our 'need' is 1/52nd of the total budget for 1966, the sum necessary for every Sunday.

Because the above is true and, moreso, because the need for increased services of the church are pressing upon us both by way of vol er services on the part of our ers as well as service needs which could be reflected in greater budget requests - - because of the pressing situation before our congregation, we will be hearing more about an Enlistment of Time, Talent and Treasure, this to transpire in the months of October and November. A calendar of special Sundays for special emphases will be announced as well as planned meetings of the congregation to give all an opportunity to participate in this Enlistment. The Enlistment Committee and its sub-committees are hard at work formalizing all plans and accomplishing all committee responsibilities to bring forth a wellrounded Enlistment. Our goal is to bring each member of the church into active participation in the life of the church in 1967.

"BACK TO CHURCH" SUNDAY, SEPT. 11th



This is the day to which we point for all our folk to be back in the services, after a period of summer week-ends at the Shore and elsewhere. This is our "Back to Church" Sunday and it heralds the return of our Senior Choir in the 10:15 a.m. service and the first ap pearance of our Youth Choir in the 8 a.m. service. Further, it will herald the beginning of a new order of worship for the Lord's Day, adapted from the 'Order' suggested by our denomination. This 'Order' will be quite different from that which we've used but is one you will grow to appreciate, though it

will seem strange for a time.
With this Sunday the Pastor also returns to the use of the Gospel selection as the basis of the morn-ing sermon, a practice we interrupt ed for the summer.

In the Church School, beginning at 9 a.m., an emphasis of fall renewal also will be sounded, so it is imperative that Church School scholars and staff be back in the

departments by that Sunday.

The theme "Back to Church" (and Church School) is a rallying theme for the renewal of vows and intentions on the part of our folk to be very regular at the House of the Lord each Lord's Day, that the full benefits of loyalty to and participation in the Lord's work at His church may be experienced from day to day. Membership at United Evang elical is that which is expected to be expressed in constant loyalty and devotion. As a young man said to the pastor, in commenting on the statement appearing on the outdoor bulletin board - "Worship in God's House regularly", "Pastor, that statement is not complete. It ought to read, "Worship in God's House regularly, not annually." May be you are one who needs to listen and obey.


CONFIRMATION CLASS **ORGANIZES**
