which we prepare again for the ing of Jesus. And, four weeks before Christmas brings us to the close of November, which thus becomes the beginning of a new Christian Church Year. Thus, we are at present in the last weeks of Trinity, the last season of the Church Year. The year ends with the Sunday before Thanksgiving and the new year begins with the last Sunday of November (four weeks before Christ-

But the close of Trinity brings another anniversary to us, the 5th anniversary of Pastor Rasche's work here at United Church. Your pastor will celebrate this 5th anniversary on the first Sunday of Advent, for it was on Sunday, Nov. 26, 1961 that he took up the pastoral work with this congregation.


"TOTENFEST" SUNDAY NOVEMBER 20
