And them, on Christmas Eve, at the hours of 8 p.m. and 10:45 p.m. we shall gather for our traditional Christmas Eve services, the point toward which the entire season of

Advent directs us.

Advent is a time of preparation. May we give the Spirit of God ample opportunity to adequately prepare us for the birth of the Lord anew by our constancy in God's House.



# CHRISTMAS EVE SERVICES 8 P.M. and 10:45 P.M. CHRISTMAS DAY SERVICE 10:15 A.M. ONLY

The 8 p.m. Christmas Eve service will be identical to the service at 10:45 p.m. and is planned for those families with small children. The meal will be served at 12, and then at 1:30 p.m. the children and members of the various departments of the Church School will go to the departments for the detoration of same for Christmas.
