

This is the title of a song that Peggy Lee has made popular through the years as we hear frequently on our radio sets.

But it is also a desire your pas tor wants to express. He desires telephone calls at times when he can be of service to you as members of the church. He wants to be aware of times when you are sick or times when you must go to the hospital for surgery.

If you are ill and desire the pastor to call upon you either at home or at the hospital, he has no way of knowing this but that you in f m him. And, it is best that

f m him. And, it is best that ler you yourself or a family mem ber call direct rather than let the word get to the pastor second-hand. For in that case the pastor does not know whether a call is desired, for there are folk who want no call ers during illness, not even the pastor. This point of view must also be respected. Thus, a personal call is the best answer.

When surgery approaches, the pas tor desires to know it early enough so either a prayer can be given in private before the altar after the church service on Sunday with the expectant patient present (the preferred way, since the House of God is the center of our prayer life and the means of God's presence with us), or that the pastor can come to the hospital a day before or some hours before surgery is scheduled (before hospital preparations) and speak with and pray with

you, and prepare you spiritually for the ordeal of surgery. Then the pastor wants to return again the day after surgery (when anesthesia and grogginess is past) to again spend time in continuing prayer for God's presence and strength in the post-operative period.

God's presence and strength in the post-operative period. Although this is the usual proce dure, emergencies at any time bring the pastor to you, if only you or a family member will call. If the information is given the pastor on a Sunday at church, please have the name of the patient and the address of the home or the name of hospital written down, so the pastor will not forget the details. "Just call me" is the message we

"Just call me" is the message we should remember, for the pastor is never too busy to come to you in time of need.



SCHEDULE OF SERVICES DEPENDABLE

There is a need for dependability in our faith. We must always know we can depend upon our Heavenly Father, whose love is over us all the time and who is as close as our prayers permit Him to be. We thank God for this dependence we can have upon Him.

There is further a need for de-

pendability on the part of our church. We need to always know we can depend upon the church to serve our spiritual needs. Thus we here at United seek to maintain the regu lar schedule of services the year round, with change only on special Sundays or in case of unusual circumstance. So, we abide by a strict time schedule - 8 a.m. and 10:15 a.m. each Sunday, save that on each Communion Sunday, (the 1st Sunday of the month) the early service begins at 7:45 a.m. Also we maintain a Church School session at 9 a.m. each Sunday of the year, not closing down in summer. We want to provide you with a dependale church.

Lastly, the church wants to depend on you. The motto we have chos en for this fall-winter season suggests this. Let's repeat it again -Everybody Back to Church Regularly. As a member of the church, your church really depends upon your con cern and participation in the life of United. As we expect dependability on the part of God and our church, so also God and the church look for dependability from you. For the Sundays of November, the regular Order for the Lord's Day

will be followed each Sunday, save on the Communion Sunday, when we use the Communion Order. The pastor will bring the messages on all but Nov. 12, when Mr. Fletcher Lutz, comp-troller of our Central Atlantic Con ference and a very able lay-speaker will bring the story of the work of our Central Atlantic Conference and of our United Church of Christ.



At the 10:15 a.m. service on the last Sunday of the Church Year, Nov. 26, we again gather in memory of departed loved ones: those who have been called since last Totenfest and whose funeral service is recorded in our records, and all others of our departed loved ones whom we remember in deep love.

Three choirs rehearse regularly through the weeks and sing on regular schedules at our services. The Senior Choir is for all folk


The Senior Choir is for all folk '5 yrs of age and older; rehearses Thursdays at 7:30 p.m.

FOOD AND Clothing

Traditionally we here at United have a Pantry in operation throughout the year and at Thanksgiving and Christmas prepare special baskets for those in need in our commun ity. The canned goods and cash to maintain this program are supplied by our folk in canned goods drives.

All the other Protestant church groups of our community who are mem bers of our Canton Christian Council do something similar for those in need.

Because this is true we are centralizing this effort for our five churches and the headquarters will be here at United, with all 5 churches bringing their donated canned goods and cash for this year round Pantry program and for the holiday baskets. All requests will be directed here by the other four pastors with their personal verification; the requests for baskets will be cleared here so there is no duplication, and a committee of one member of the Council from each of the churches will be responsible for preparing the baskets for distribution.

You are invited to continue to share in this worthwhile Good Samaritan project by bringing your can ned goods and cash offerings to the church any Sunday through Nov. 19th The needy of the community will be thankful to you for this generosity on your part.

Requests also come through the year for clothing of various kinds. This is being centered for all our churches at Holy Evangelist Church, where a Clothing Center is being es tablished. The pastors, receiving requests for clothing will send these verified requests to the pas-tor of Holy Evangelist Church.

Any unused clothing, including substantial shoes, but not hats, that you can provide(it must be clean and in good repair, for we lave no menders nor can we afford lry cleaning) will be appreciated. Bring it here to the church and it will be taken to the clothing depot
