OUR 95TH ANNIVERSARY

Although not the oldest church in the Canton area of Baltimore, our United Church, through the years; has been one of the most important congregations. Just a few days ago a former resident of this area, who is now quite aged, said to me, "When I was growing up, Batz's Church(the colloqual name for United) and Sacred Heart Catholic Church were the two chief churches in Canton, claiming most of the residents of this very old section of the Baltimore area" (at that time everything east of East Ave. was actually 'county' and not 'city')

Thousands of folk through these years have known United as their home church. Constantly your pastor comes into contact with folk who were a part of this church before moving to other areas. Also there are many who still live in the Canton area, who seldom or never attend here, and yet who have no other church home. Our church is one possessed of a 'membership,' and then a 'constituency,' a large group who call this their church but who are not actually members here. United Church is still a

church of power in this community.

As we celebrate our 95th Anniversary as a congregation on this very spot of founding, there are many parochial aspects of our life which linger, many loyalties to this which may have been our family church and which is our church. This is good. We need to have a strong loyalty to the church; there is a place for strong emotional ties to a particular church. For us, no matter where we move in the metropolitan area, this ought to remain our family church if at all possible. It needs be said, however, that this affiliation with United must be an active one. It does us no good, nor the church, to consider this our church but never come. We need to get down to United for the services of worship and the Sacraments. We need to maintain our membership here in a vital way.

But we need to have a larger outlook concerning 'The Church.' We
need to think of our church as being a part of 'The Church,' and as
such to broaden our view and concern to the recognition that no long
er can each local church play it
alone in a community; to really
serve the needs of the community
each local church must cooperate

and work together with the other community churches. In this manner a church can serve its own flock and also be a continuous part of the strengthening impact upon a community.

As we celebrate our 95th year we are seeking to accomplish both these goals, to be an active church for members, to gather together an active flock; and to participate in the larger responsibility through the Canton Christian Council, a coordinating body for our five Protestant churches in Canton. We pray the blessings of Almighty God upon both our efforts: that this church may continue by itself and with others to bring forth the will of God in the lives of today's people in today's community and world.



SUNDAYS IN SEPTEMBER

With September we return to the more formal Order of Service in which we include the Confession of Sins each Sunday and the other elements of the Lord's Day Service. May the pastor remind our folk as they sit in the main section of the sanc tuary or in the little 'baby' room on the side that all are admonished to sing the 'Amens' as well as to fully participate in the service, standing for and singing the hymns, taking part in all phases of service. Though you may not know each hymn, join in the singing and learn it. It is not the proper spirit to not participate.

With September we also rejoice in the return of our choirs to beautify and dignify our services by the Processionals, Recessionals as well as their grand anthems. Since during the summer we have had the acoustic-tiled ceilings painted, we are led to believe our organ sounds more brilliant and the choisters should be heard more clearly.

Sundays in September bring the Sacrament of Holy Communion on the 1st Sunday, with the early service beginning at 7:45 a.m. Our 95th Anniversary service on the 22nd means that all our folk should be here at their church that day. You have noted the special covering given the Anniversary elsewhere.

With September we urge a 'back to church' movement by all our folk, many of whom have been at shores all summer. Your church calls you sincerely to be at the services of worship regularly with the end of the summer season.
