It has been some weeks since the last Endeavor was sent to your home and it is important to review the occurrences since then. Chiefly, we have moved through the season of Lent and Easter. Attendance - wise the services were better for both the Wednesday evenings as well as the Sunday mornings, with nearly 300 more folk being present this year on Sundays and the increase noticeable also on Wednesdays, and for Holy Week. Spiritually also it is felt the season was outstanding, for the expressions of concern and inspiration were readily forthcoming.

Certainly among the important events in April was the 25th anniver sary of our Young Women's Guild, an event which was celebrated in a won derful banquet-meeting as well as in the service on Sunday, April 20. We congratulate this important facet of our church life and wish the group many, many more years of help ful service to their church.

Another aspect of this report of church life can deal with our Sewing group, a growing group, an active group in the area of social service. Early this year this group of women prepared the following for City Hospital - 40 therapy balls, 42 pr. scuffs, 7 pr. knitted scuffs 22 bed jackets, 15 slacks, 69 towel bibs, 21 utility bags. Since then the following have been prepared for the Leprosy group- 20 towel bundles 33 white shirts, 84 bundles of band ages with 6 rolls to a bundle. The group invites other ladies to join it on Tuesdays at 10 a.m.

A TRIP TO OBERAMMERGAU IN 1970

Some months ago, from among the congregation, came the suggestion to Pastor and Mrs. Rasche that a journey to Oberammergau, Germany in 1970 for the Oberammergau Passion Play be arranged. This world-famous Passion Play is only presented once every decade, and 1970 is the

year. From this suggestion, contact has been made with an airline and a travel agency, and a definite tour worked out. The date of departure will be Aug. 1, 1970, by air from New York. We will fly to Munich, Germany, and then go to Oberammerague and surrounding area, including some famous castles in southern Germany. Then we will trav el by bus down through Italy to Rome, spending some time enroute. After some days in Rome we will go north through Rappola and Milan to Switzerland. The remaining time of the tour will include Paris, a trip on the Rhine River, Cologne, and Frankfurt. In all the tour will consume 21 days. The one price will

include all air travel, hotels, all breakfasts and evening meals, tips, entrance fees, travel by train or by boat in Europe, a tour guide who will accompany the group from arriv al in Europe to departure. The price is \$796.00 per person. This low price is contingent upon the gathering of at least 15 persons to make up the group. Being by far the best way to see Europe, this proposed tour offers a very full 21 days. If you are interested, mention it to the pastor. A fuller prospectus will be available within a short time.
