Each third Sunday of the month we will be devoting a portion of the 10:15 a.m. service for special prayers for the ill and others in special need, as the requests for these prayers are given the office. The names of those for whom special prayers will be made will be announ ced, and the Pastor will be at the prie-dieu(kneeling bench) for this service of prayers. Requests for prayers with the names and the nature of the needs must be in the office the Wed. prior to the third Sunday, and again, these should be coming from the family. No verbal requests taken.

LISTING OF Hospital Patients

Beginning in September we will seek to list each Sunday the names of those confined in hospitals. We will depend solely upon reports to the office of members who are thus confined. We do this so that the folk of the church may be aware of hospitalized members.

We will seek to list the name and the hospital as long as the individual is hospitalized. But to do this we must have the cooperation of our families and members -

a)to inform the church office of hospitalization

b)to inform the office when the i 'ividual has been released from hospital, so that information may also be given.

c)we must depend upon the family and cannot be responsible for omitting those who have not been report ed to us either by phone or in writ ing on Sunday. Verbal reports at the church door are not acceptable, it must be by phone to the office or in writing.

This is an endeavor to be of assistance to the congregation, but if it does not work out, it will be then discontinued. You are the only ones who can make it work, so be cooperative, please.

OUR SHUTINS

To make our membership aware of the shutins, we are publishing the list of these shut-ins as we have it. For each of these folk we desire the birthday of the individual Also as you read the list, if there be a member of your family whose name ought to be on this list, we request you to phone that name and address and birthdate in to the office. A shut-in is one who is confined to the home or Nursing Home because of a chronic illness, oldage or incapacity which prevents the individual from coming to the services of worship.

In some succeeding issue of The Endeavor we will begin listing the shut-ins with birthdays in the coming month, suggesting that folk may desire to send them a note or card on their natal day.

Again, this can only work if the family members cooperate in giving us names of shut-ins and supplying birthdates.

HELP YOU GET To Church

Often there is a desire upon the part of an individual(shut-in or otherwise) to be at the services but who live too far to walk and who have no transportation. Endeavoring to assist such folk, the Church Council requests such folk to list their names at the church office, and an attempt will be made to get rides for them to and fro.

To make this possible, we also need volunteers from the membership who will pick-up members on their way to church and also return them to their homes. Members so inclined are also invited to register this willingness at the church office and the office will seek to match up driver and rider. This can be a helpful plan if folk cooperate in it.

DIGEST OF ACTIONS CONFERENCE MEETING

This meeting in June of our Central Atlantic Conference was attend ed by your pastors and elected dele gates. Following is a digest of the actions of said Conference meeting.

1.Elected for four year terms, Francis X. Pirazzini as Conference Minister and Bernie Zerkel, Jr., War ren Hilfiker and Charles Chamberlain as Associate Conference Ministers.

2.Approved a total budget 1970 of \$775,000.00, and a disbursment schedule of this budget of \$668,000.00.

3.Voted to establish a position of Conference Associate in Urban Ministry and Parish Renewal.

4.Adopted a resolution reinterating the previous action of placing the highest priority on the Crisis in the Nation and urging all local churches to contribute for this pur pose an amount equal to 1% up to 5% of their current expense budget as a congregational contribution for this specific cause.

5.Adopted report of Goals, Objective and Priorities Committee which had been at work for two yrs. studying our Conference and its working. This plan will have its outworking in future years.
