Keeping You Posted

"Keeping You Posted" is a newsheet which is published for the clergy by our denomination, a service to keep one informed about the United Church of Christ. Following are some paragraphs from the latest issue - - -

WESTERN REP FOR UCBWM

A former UC Board for World Minis tries missionary in Africa, Neill Richards, has been elected by the Board to serve as its representative in the western states. Mr. Richards, who is based in Berkeley, Cal., will do interpretative educucational work for the Board and will interview applicants for overseas service. In 1967 Mr. Richards was ousted from Rhodesia by the Ian Smith government which claimed he was 'engaged in activities prejucicial to the best interests of the He had taught since 1964 at Epworth Theological Seminary in Salisbury, an inter-denominational school which trains African pastors He also served as chairman of the social concerns committee of the Salisbury Council of Churches.

DR. PAUL T. LAUBY, UCC minister and former UCBWM(United Church Board of World Missions) missionary is the new executive secretary for the United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia. In 1953 he went to Silliman University in the Philippines, serving as a missionary teacher on the faculty of the College of Theology and as pastor of the University Church. He helped reorganize the curriculum of the school which trains pastors and oth er religious workers for the United Church in the Philippines. He became dean of the college in 1961 and was elected vice president for academic affairs of the university in 1965.

HERBSTER HONORED AT LOCAL CHURCH CONFERENCE

An all-day conference on the local church was chosen as an appropriate means of honoring retiring UCC President Ben Mohr Herbster. Sponsored by the Executive Council and Union Theological Seminary, it was to be held Sept. 25 at Riverside Church in New York City.

The welfare of the local church was one of Dr. Herbster's deepest concerns. During his eight years in office, he was a warm defender of its strengths and a sincere critic

of its weaknesses.

Papers on the subject were to be presented by Dr. Gabriel J. Fackre, professor of theology and culture at Lancaster Seminary; Avery D. Post, pastor of Scarsdale, N.Y., UCC minister-elect of the Massachusetts Conference; Mrs. Margaret Haywood, a Washington, D.C. laywoman and member of the Executive Council, and Sam Roberts, A Union Seminary student.

Dr. Herbster was scheduled to ad dress the conference at the conclus ion of the banquet.

CALIFORNIA WORLD HUNGER CONFERENCE To be held Oct. 23,24 at Anaheim. Sponsored by interfaith and secular agencies, the conference will bring together outstanding authorities on population dynamics, family planning and food production. Our Council for Lay Life and We has made a grant to the project \ which UCC layman Douglas Chalmers, Newport Beach, Cal., has been a moving spirit. The UC Board for World Ministries will be represented by William K. Whitcomb, on furlough from India where he has been working in the development of water resources, family planning and improvement of agriculture methods.
