THE DEEPER **MEANING OF** CHRISTMAS

As we get into the hubbub and the vicious schedule that goes with the celebration of Christmas - the trees, lights, gifts, pageantry, greeting cards, family get-to-geth-ers - it is rather an easy matter to forget that the center of Christ mas is a Person. He is the Person who has shown us what "a truly hu-man existence" means. He is the P rson in whom God has entered reptively into history. He is the Person in whom Christian faith sees both God and man.

If it seems a bit incredulous to state that in Jesus we see both God and man, may we remind ourselves that the life of Jesus, whose coming to earth we celebrate at Christ mas, was truly human. He was born a baby and grew to become a man. These facts have been attested to by history.

But, how then can we say He was But, how then can we say He was completely divine? May we pose the simple question - If God should come personally into a human being, what kind of person would that be? Certainly we would allow that He would be known through the same kind of perfect goodness that we know to be God. And that is what we see in Jesus our Lord. Jesus, however, did not begin as a man, as a human baby and develop

TINSEL DAY IS A HAPPY DAY FOR ALL

We would be most delighted to have you and your family join us at the church on Tinsel Day, Sunday, 14th, beginning with the noon

Perchance you've been hesitant about coming heretofore, so better make up your family mind to come this year.

Here is a rundown of the activities of the day:

We begin with a prepared dinner at about the noon hour, for which there is no direct charge, but an offering received of your descretion.

After the meal, about 1:30 pm the children and youth go to their departments to decorate the rooms for Christmas, putting up the departmental tree and prettying every thing up. At the same time the older youth and adults have the privilage of decorating the tree in the sanctuary, while other adults are engaged in a Christmas handicraft ~~oject.

When the big tree is finished, gather in the sanctuary for the ceremony of the lighting of the tree and the singing of carols in the dim glow of late afternoon. After that we return to the lower aud itorium for our 'birthday party for Jesus,' and for a piece of birthday cake and the conclusion of the day.

Both the very young, the children and the parents and grand parents are heartily invited to this occasion. Do come, for it is one of the loveliest days in all the year here at your church. We do ask that you sign a reservation slip for yourself and family if you are coming to the meal. These slips can be secured at the church and in Church School classes.



THE ADVENT WREATH

With this Advent season we incorparate another meaningful custom in our Advent Sunday services, the inclusion of the Advent wreath. This is a wreath which hangs horizontally in the Chancel and which has four candles (one for each of the Advent Sundays) plus the Christ candle in the center. Our 'wreath' is of bronze with inscribed with Biblical messages in kiln-fired colors. There is one pink candle and three violet candles, the pink signifying the expection of the Lord, to be lighted the 1st Sunday in Advent, the others to De lighted on succeeding Sundays, and the Christ Candle on Christmas Eve. The lighting of these candles will become a part of our Advent ceremonials, and each will be introduced by appropriate Scriptures.



THE VALUE OF CEREMONIALS

It has been some years since the interpretation of our Advent ceremonials has been given in full. A number of new folk have joined our fellowship since, and it may be worthwhile to again give words of explanation.

Jesus, in His ministry upon our earth, made much use of illustrative material, to illustrate the message of God He was expressing. It is always good to illustrate, to make plain the message of our faith so that all may understand. The message of Advent is so wonderful that we cannot let it be puzzling to anyone, thus we use many means to picture this message.

Some of these means are the cere onials we have incorporated into our Sunday Advent services, whereby we not only give explanation to spiritual truths but beautify our services. The Christmas greens, the wreaths, the poinsettia and the tree, as well as the Christmas creche, together with the Scripture readings, the music of the hymns and the choirs, plus the messages from the pulpit - all add together to bring the message of Christmas into our hearts, that we may abide in the love of God through Christ and seek to live the Christ life all our days.
