

THERE IS NO COMPULSION

We are in the season of Christmas tide, the post-Christmas season. In spirit the season of Christmastide continues for many weeks, for the glow of Christmas is slow to leave our hearts. In actuality the Christmastide season begins with Christmas Day and continues to Epiphany (Jan.6), when the season of Epiphany begins, that season in which we consider the lessons of the youthful life of Jesus.

Christ did not come to the earth the first time with pomp and circum stance. His entrance into the life of man was lowly and unpretentious. There was no edict that the world had to receive the Christ. There was no compulsion that any had to follow Him as disciples later on

ing His Ministry. There was no compulsion that any who believed in Jesus after Pentecost, when persecution became very real, had to continue. No one was forced to give up his life for Jesus, as literally thousands did, in the 300 yrs. of severe persecution of the Christian position. Anyone could have sidestepped the issue and gone scotfree There was never any compulsion to the Christian position, that is, save the compulsion of the individual human heart to remain true to the conviction of Christ as personal Lord.

There is no compulsion from without against any of you today. There is no law upon the books of Maryland which says you have to belong to a church. You can go scotfree and never darken the door of the church or ever take unto yourself any of the self-imposed laws of dis

cipline which the Christian position suggests. There is no compulsion save the inner compulsion of the Christian position you have tak en upon yourself when you professed the Christ and became a part of His Church. No one forced you, you did this because the Spirit moved you to do so, and having done so, then the church in which you professed yourself does not use temerity in suggesting you fulfil these self-imposed or adopted principles of loyalty to the church, as the emissary of Christ upon earth, and complete discipleship unto the Lord.

In this discipleship is the fulfillment of Scripture when it says to us, 'As ye have freely received, so freely give.' Herein is the prin ciple of stewardship expressed, a principle which is dead-center in the Christian doctrine and which one cannot sidestep and still feel he is a Christian. And yet this prin ciple carries no compulsion from without, save the compulsion we have taken upon ourselves. We who have received without measure of goodness of God and Christ are neither to count the extent of our giving of money, love and our talents. Thus the church, in the fulfillment of its responsibility to guide us in all phases of the Christian life-to pray unceasingly, the study God's Word diligently, to attend God's House regularly- also gives guidelines to our giving, guidelines which are not meant to be laws which are laid down, or dues which are set up. It is in the receiving of the suggestion the church makes, in the spirit in which this suggest ion is given, that our largeness of the Christian spirit is measured.

Soon to each member will come the suggestion for giving in 1970, not in the spirit of compulsion but in the spirit of Christian preciseness Our faith is not vague, it is pre-

cise. We ask that each member study the brochure, soon to reach you, in this light, considering that herein is no compulsion save the compulsion brought on by our love of the Lord and His Church.



EPIPHANY SUNDAYS IN JANUARY

To maintain the spirit of Christmas the Christian Church year moves right into the season of Epiphany after Christmastide. In Epiphany the Gospel concerns are with the events of the coming of the Wisemen to worship the Christ at His home, the visits to the Temple and even the account of the baptism of Jesus Epiphany leads us into the pre-Lent and Lenten season.
