Dr. and Mrs. Arole, not clergy but medical people, were as sociated with our United Church of Christ as directors of our rural hospitals in Vadala, India. Dr. Rajamikant is taking work in public health and Dr. Mabelle is working in the field of family planning. They will return to India in June to work at Maharashtra, about 400 mi. south of Bombay, where they will undertake a pioneering program for our Board focused on prevention of disease through preventative med ecine and treatment and education. Dr. Arole will speak in both services and Dr. Mabelle will speak in the departments of the Church Sch.


KEEP BUSY THIS WINTER

SYMBOLS OF OUR FAITH

Our Lord's last words to his disciples: "Go and teach all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost" eves us the statement of the docne of the Holy Trinity. The equilateral triangle is one of the oldest symbols. The union of three equal sides suggests the one and in separable Divine Essence. The three fish arranged in the form of a triangle is also a very ancient symbol One fish alone is the ancient symbol of the Saviour. Three fish teach that Three Persons have part in man's salvation: a. the sacrifice of the Son, as a means to salvation; b.the application of salvation through the work of the Holy Spirit; c. the prompting cause of salvation, the love of the Heavenly father. Hence man's salvation proceeds from a Triune God.
