A series of three meetings are in process of being held for key leaders and pastors of the 20 some churches in the area, and, following the amnual meeting in May, it is hoped this strategy will be form ulated. J. Albert Fader, Fred Long and their wives are our key leaders

The annual meeting of the associa tion will be held on May 3rd at our Huber Memorial UCC, The Alameda and 29th street, beginning at 3 p.m.and close with the evening meal. Our congregation will be represented by four selected delegates and the Pas

tors.

RESUME OF ITEMS FOR CONGREGATIONAL MEETING — SUN. APRIL 19

The matters of business at this special meeting, called by the Senior Church Council, will be to discuss the proposals suggested by the Pastor at the annual meeting in Jan As was reported, two of the seven proposals were adopted at that meet ing. The remainder will be up for action at this special meeting, be held in the sanctuary, immediate ly following the abbreviated 10:15 a.m.service on April 19th. In a way this special meeting is a trial of one of the proposals, which is to liberalize our constitution, to per mit regular meetings to be held on other nights than those stipulated in that document, which at present state that the Nov. meeting must be held on the date which normally coincides with the day after Thanks giving and the other the last Friday in Jan.

The proposals were sent out to you with the March issue of this paper, but here, in brief, is the substance of the other four:

The suggestion that the approach to our idea of the Order of Worship for the morning services be include the participation in a real manner, and not just to assist in the usher the Offering, the Communion, etc, of the enlarged concept of our Junior Council, which as of 1970 has been changed to include young ladies. The inauguration of a Service Corp of youth to assist the pastors in a very real manner in the services in a regular schedule.

Another proposal is akin to this one - that the youth of the church would at times be invited to plan and develop and conduct services of worship which would be beamed more specifically at the youth ideas then our normal mode of worship can

be catagorized.

Yet another proposal concerns our concept of the use of our church property for community functions. We have fine property, a gym, splendid rooms in the Church School bldg, and Friendship Hall. To use these to greater extent community purposes might cause increase in cost of light, hear, etc. Church Council needs guidance upon this matter.

The final proposal is to discontinue Good Friday evening service, because it is rather superfluous.
