I am referring to the institut-'ng of a Will by each individual, .ich Will spells out exactly the desires of the individual as to how one's belongings are to be dealt with following the conclusion of life.

Because a great many men as well as women(but certainly including wo men) - because many feel it is morose to think of death much less to prepare for it, it is still true that great number of folk have no will and die without one.

As a Christian this is never to be understood. If we believe that all good gifts come from the hand of the Father God, and He expects us to carefully administer the good things of the world we have (and each of us has more possessions that we sometimes imagine, even the least of us), then God also expects us to arrange that these belongings (personal belongings, house, investments, cash in bank, etc) be right-fully taken care of after our death. To fulfill this expectation of our Stewardship is not morose or frightening or, even inviting death as some wrongfully suppose. It is the expression of our Christian duty.

Within the coming weeks definite helps on the making of a Will are to be placed in the pamphlet rack at church. You ought to take a

copy and read it carefully.

A Will is a legal document where by those who remain of your family and friends after your departure will know exactly what your decision is concerning the disposal of

your goods, etc.

As you prepare this Will, please remember, a part of your stewardship, a definite precentage of your worldly goods ought to be devoted to the continuance of your influence and love here at your church. This definitely is a part of your stewardship, to remember the church in a worthwhile manner through your estate.

Our entire congregation has been blessed in past months and years by specific mention in a number of wills - in one case the house was willed to the church - in many others various sums of money in the hundreds and thousands.

Once each year your pastor feels it is of merit to remind all concerning this procedure of life. If you have not heeded the appeals in the past, let not another plea go unheeded - by all means make a will and in this will may your church be among those who are specially remem bered.

When you have prepared your will you have also prepared the way in which your goods will be distribut ed. Thus, where there's a will, there's a way.

ECUMENICAL MARRIAGES

When a Protestant becomes the husband or wife of a member of another faith there transpires what used to be called a'mixed marriage'. The new name for such a union is 'an ecumenical marriage,' and the usual union is between a Protestant and a Roman Catholic.

Heretofore, because of the pressure put on Roman Catholics that their's was the only true faith, and they dare not depart from the faith even in marriage, and, if they did, certain status loss in their own church was suffered - because of this, most Protestants had to give in to be married outside their own church.

This is now different. Our sister church has now changed its opin ion. By special arrangement, which

takes some time, it is now possible for a Roman Catholic to be married in a Protestant Church with his or her priest being present and assist ing in the service, and wherein the Roman Catholic does not lose status in their church, but the marriage is also registered in the Roman Catholic parish. Such a wedding was held in our church during the past 60 days.

Our youth ought to remember this as they may be moving toward marriage with a Roman Catholic, to know that from this time onward, the marriage need not always be conducted in the Roman Catholic Church even with the Pastor assisting. We rejoice in this change of thought on the part of our sister church.

RESULTS OF THE CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

The congregation, in a specially called meeting after the service on April 19, took action on certain proposals contained in the Pastor's Report for 1969, which proposals had been previously circulated among the congregation. This meeting itself was in a way an experiment, seeking to demonstrate the feasibility of one of the pastor's recommendations, to the point that the by-laws be changed to allow lee way in the dating of the two congregational meetings.

As regards the proposal concerning the inauguration of a Service Corp, composed to Junior Council young men and women, which group would be carefully and precisely trained for participation in the worship services, under the direction of the Pastor, this received ap

proval.

Also favorably received and voted upon was the plan to permit greater usage of our church plant and facilities to groups within the community and to serve community groups. This usuage, of course, would be strictly under the gover-

nance and guidance of the Church Council.

The Good Friday evening service will be eliminated from the Holy Week schedule of services, beginning with the 1971 season.

The Church Council was given lee way to set the dates of the two con gregational meetings, with the stip ulation that the budget and election meeting be in November and the report and planning meeting be in January.
