This will be the first Communion of the Fall season here at United. Truly, the offering of the Sacrament again after the transition of the summer months, plus the emotional appeal of World Wide Communion, should bring all our members to the church for the Sacrament this day. For it is on this single day in the entire year that all of Protestant-

joins in the Sacrament, not on-here in the U. S. but around the world. At all other seasons indivi-dual churches and communions follow their own schedules. Some have Communion each Sunday. Others monthly, yet others seasonally. However, on the first Sunday of every October, all join in the provision of the Sacrament to their congregations. So, from the fartherest, remote section of the world to the U.S., in their various time zones, non-Roman Catholics join in the observance of the Lord's Supper. And, since the Roman Catholic observe the Mass(the R.C. version of the Sacrament) every Sunday, it can realistically be said that all Christians are urged to partake of the blessed Sacrament on this particular Sunday. Is this not in itself an achievement in the furtherance of unity in Spirit?

MOMENTS OF CONCERN

"In Korea, you help support the Children's Charity Hospital which, in addition to its normal work, includes care for 27,000 inpatients (and 12,000 outpatients) per year and serves as medical center for 10 000 orphans in 100 orphanes in the Pusan area.
