#### **ADVENT SUNDAYS**

The new Christian Church year begins with the season of Advent. Advent is that season wherein we prepare for Christ's coming, at Christ mas, and at the Last Time. It is a penetential season, thus we continue to include the stanza of Confession in our services.

Beginning with Sunday, Nov. 29, the Advent season not only brings messages by Pastor Rasche on the theme, 'Advent and Christmas Brings' and the beautiful music of Advent and Christmas from our hymnals and by the choirs but also the Advent Ceremonials which have become traditional with us here at United.

Our first ceremonial is the hanging of the Advent and Christmas Greens in our sanctuary. On Sunday, Dec. 6, we add the beautiful Christ mas wreaths. On the 3rd Sunday in Advent we display our beautiful Italian creche in the sanctuary and on Sunday, Dec. 20 we add the final touch, with the Poinsettia Altar and the Christmas tree. Truly our sanctuary will be blazing with beauty as we approach Christmas Eve Be with us for these wonderful Sundays. The ceremonials will be a part of the 10:15 a.m. services. Sunday, Dec. 6 will bring the Communion services for the Advent season, there being no Communion either at Christmas Eve or the last Sun day of the year.

On Sunday, Dec. 20 at the hour of 9 a.m. (between the two preaching services) our Church School will have its Christmas service in the sanctuary.

On Sunday, Dec. 27, the Sunday af ter Christmas, at the 10:15 a.m. service, our choirs will present the Christmas cantata, 'Wonderful Love," a musical offering you will appreciate.



## CHRISTMAS EVE SERVICES 8 P.M. — 10:45 P.M.

Attendance at either one of the Christmas Eve services should be a definite part of Christmas for all our families. Let us not become so unmindful of the real truth of the great day that we fail to place the presence in God's House at the very center of our observance.

Since each of these services is identical to the other, it matters not which one we attend. Some prefer the earlier service for the sake of younger children(even the very young should not be deprived from attendance at the Christmas Eve service); some prefer the spiritual thrill of being in God's House up until the hour of midnight

Each service is a candlelighting service, conducted in the glow of the Christmas candles and the light of the Christmas tree. Each service includes a message of Christmas from the pulpit and the glorious music of Christmas by our choral groups. Each service includes the service of candlelighting, the traditional service for Christmas Eve. Each service includes the Christmas offering, wherein each child of God has the opportunity of bringing a love gift unto the Lord whose birthday we celebrate.

The 8 p.m. service only will include the placing of the figure of the baby Jesus in the crib in our lovely creche, the final touch of our ceremonials for Advent and for Christmas.



## TINSEL DAY DEC. 13 12 — 4 P.M.

Tinsel Day is family day at our church, for on this Sunday we remain after the late service, and have our noon dinner together. The meal is prepared and there is definite cost, only an offering. Reservations, however, should be given in, so we know how many for whom to prepare.

The meal begins at noon, and is for family groups, including the children. At approximately 1:30 the children and members of the department of our Church School, toge ther with their teachers go to the various departments to decorate the departments and the trees for the Christmas season. The youth with the assistance of Council members put up the tree in the sanctuary. Adults are invited to remain in the lower auditorium and work on the Advent-Christmas handiwork suggested, something to take home with you for decoration of your home. At approximately 3:30 we all gather in the sanctuary for a 'carol sing' and the official lighting of church Christmas tree. Then we again to Friendship Hall for our 'birthday party' for Jesus and a piece of birthday cake, and we are dismissed for the afternoon.



Each year we seek to make Christmas a bit happier for shut-ins. The date this year is Sunday, Dec. 20 and the time is 6:30 p.m. Meet on the Dillon St. side of the church, coming dressed to walk about outside, and with a flashlight. After carolling we'll have something hot to drink. We want adults as well as youth, and invite you to bring your junior children along.



## CHURCH SCHOOL CHRISTMAS SERVICE DEC. 20 — 9 A.M.
