GO WITH US TO EUROPE IN 1972

A tour to Europe in 1972 is in the making, under the direction of Pastor and Mrs. Rasche. Tentative departure time would be the latter part of June(after school closes) for a 21 day period. This tour would go to Germany, then the Scandinavian countries, London and the Low Countries. Total cost will be in the neighborhood of \$1000.00, all transportation (from N.Y.) and lodging and 2 meals a day included. Be thinking about this. Plans are to be finalized shortly and a brochure issued soon.



CRISIS IN THE NATION

No one has to be told there is grave crisis in our nation and in our world today. Times of crisis always bring forth need, need on the part of fellow human beings.

The church must be at work in the areas of crisis, for where there is need, there the Church of the Lord Christ must be busy.

Your Central Atlantic Conference is expending efforts in various areas of need in our own territory, of which you may not be aware. To inform you, here are brief resumes of some of this work -

North East Community Organization in Baltimore (NECO), a mass based community organization serving the 110,000 citizens in n.e.Baltimore

The DARE Outreach Center, Newark, N.J., an ecumenically supported center which provides drug addiction treatment education and counselling. DARE operates 2 half-way houses in mid Newark.

The Street Ministry, Baltimore, involves the training of six men, 18-25, to work with people on the street, and to attach them as parttime workers in 6 churches in the general Montebello area of the city. These street ministers act as a link between the churches and the people of the community, mostly black, seeking to minister to their needs in the name of the local church.

Juvenile Justice Program, Washing ton, D.C., an ecumenical program de signed to recruit, educate and prepare persons, primarily church re-lated, for effective involvement in the problems of poverty, racism and injustice as these factors relate

to problems of juvenile justice.

The Hour of Awareness and Liberation, Newark, N.J. is an attempt to bring together black church and com munity people around issues that affect them. This work is channel-led through the Newark Community Coalition.

TRUST, Richmond, Va., stand for Task Force for Research, Urban Urban Strategy and Training for Service and Renewal. This is an ecumenical agency geared to assist churches in their urban mission.

The Urban Teaching Internship Program, Washington, D. C. is trying to raise funds to match Feder-al funds which will be used for tui tion grants and loans for innercity students enrolled in this pro gram.

Metropolitan Ecumenical Ministry, Newark, N.J. This ministry is concerned with tenant relocation of those displaced by renewal programs, and comprehensive planning and assistance to groups desiring

and assistance to groups desiring to construct new housing in Newark.

A Neighborhood House, Plainfield,
N.J., serves the needs of a group of people ranging from small children to adults. Additional support for this work comes from local church groups and some from the Plainfield United Fund.
