### CONFERENCES COMING SOON

Our Central Atlantic Conference Il have its annual session here in Baltimore at Loyola College on Friday, June 11 through Sunday, June 13. The two pastors will be attending part time, as will the three lay delegates. Members of our official Board are serving as the lay delegates. This is the big meeting of the United Church of Christ churches in our larger area. Christ churches in our larger area known as the Central Atlantic Conference, which includes all United Churches of Christ in Maryland, N. and S. New Jersey, all of Deleware and part of Virginia and W. Virginia as well as the greater Washin gton, D.C. area. From this meeting will come the suggestions for our church life during the next year.

The General Synod of our United Church of Christ (the nationwide reting, held every two years) will we its meeting from June 24 thru June 30 at Grand Rapids, Michigan. Pastor Rasche has been chosen as one of the ten clergy delegates from our Central Atlantic Conference to attend this meeting. The other clergyman from the Baltimore area is the Rev. Mr. Paul Snead, president of our Chesapeake Associa tion and pastor of First and St. Stephens United Church of Christ on York Rd. During Pastor Rasche's absence Pastor Weisser will serve as full-time pastor.

This meeting reviews the work of our denomination during the past two years, judges it and then makes plans for our denomination for the ensuing biennium. Approximately 700 delegates and officials of the national church will be attendance for this week, as will innumerable fraternal delegates, a total of

more than 1200.

# CONFIRMATION BEGINS SEPTEMBER



Easter of 1972 will fall on April 2 which puts Ash Wednesday on Feb. 16, about 4 weeks after the Christmas season. Thus our Confirmation classes will needs be organized at an early date also.
