

TALK ABOUT MONEY!

"Talk about 'money' not 'steward 'hip'" the Lutheran Church in Ameri 's Laymen League (fund raisers) were told at a meeting a year or so ago by the Rev. Richard Peterman of Summit, N.J. He continued by saying, "The word stewardship is a cop out, a hedge, and 90% of the people don't know what you're talking about. Most Lutherans have more money then they ever had before. Our job is to point out priorities to them, to show them where to place

them, to show them where to place sir dollars."

It becomes imperative, at intervals, for your church to talk about money, for it takes money to carry on the many-faceted functions of the church, and you are the only source of your church's income.

At present the Budget Committee is putting together the financial needs for 1972 here at United, establishing the church needs for the

tablishing the church needs for the support of the work here at home & our Central Atlantic Conference and our United Church of Christ.

November is the month during which your church seeks to talk plainly about money and to relate its needs to you and your envelope giving for 1972. For a number of years we've stressed proportionate or percentage giving, wherein you are admonished as individual member givers to make your weekly gift commensurate with a definite percentage of each dollar you earn, leav-

ing the designation and calculation of the percentage to your choice, but depending on you to be honest with your church and your God as regards your stewardship, or use of

money.

As by way of example, should you choose 3% as your figure, then you would give 3¢ of every dollar earned, or 30¢ for every \$10.00 or \$3.00 for every \$100.00. If you choose 5% or 7%, the amounts can be just as easily calculated. Sad to say, the easiest thing is to put our giving at \$1.00 or \$2.00 per Sunday, when that amount may actually be way out of line with our family income.

As we face a new year, may we remember that the church has to deal with money, has to pay its bills and thus has to talk frankly with each of us as members about money. Let's not be guilty of being a copout, or evader, when it concerns our duty to set the church high on the list of the priorities of our

lives.
