apply to Sun. Jan. 2, and the January communion will be on Jan. 9th.



#### TINSEL DAY

Tinsel Day is a traditional day of joy and festivity at United, for on this day the whole church plant is made ready for Christmas, with the departments of the Church School being decorated by the pupils and teachers plus the tree in the sanctuary decorated by youth. The adults have the opportunity of making an Advent decoration for their home. All this is preceded by a fellowship dinner here at the church and concluded with a birthday party for Jesus in late afternoon plus the official lighting of the church tree and a wonderful car ol sing in the glow of the tree in late afternoon.

We invite all to participate in our Tinsel Day festivities by coming to the services to begin the day, then remaining or returning for the noon meal plus the afternoon's events. All folk of the Church and Church School with their families are invited, but this is not a community-wide event. It is for our own larger church family. Leaflets will be distributed in bulletins and at Church School whereby you and your family can sign up for the meal. There is no charge for the meal but cash donations from families will be acceptable on that day.

the sanctuary promptly at 9:00 a.m. and the presentation will last one-half hour, at which time the classes will go to departments for the giving of gifts and the departmental festivity, to conclude in time for the 10:15 a.m. service of worship.



#### TO KEEP IN YOUR MIND

Poinsettia Fund - that we may again have a lovely array of poinsettia the altar for the services of consistmas and Christmas time, we in vite the individuals of the church family, the organizations and the friends of the church to make contributions to the Poinsettia Fund, from which these plants will be pur chased. These gifts can also be in the form of memorials. Please have all Poinsettia Fund gifts in by Dec. 15, and place the name and address of donor on the envelope, and if a memorial, the name of the person in whose memory it is given.

Christmas Memorials - The Christmas Memorial services will be part of the Christmas Eve service(only one) at 8 p.m. All memorials are to be turned in to the church office by Dec. 15 if they are to be included in the Memorial brochure.

White Gifts for 1971 - Through the Church School, the White Gifts prot will remember the Biloxi Mison of our denomination, a work among the shrimp fishermen and needy of Biloxi, Miss. Folk of the Church School and Church are invited to share in this program by the contribution of soap, wash cloths, towels, combs, tooth paste, etc. You don't have to wrap these gifts but bring marked for White Gifts. Christmas Basket Food - Again our church, together with others, seeks to prepare baskets for the needy. These are prepared with food(canned goods, staple foods) contributed by the folk of the churches. Here also you can help in the project by food or cash gifts. To the canned goods we add perishables such as meat, oleo, milk, cereal, potatoes, etc., which are purchased. The Canton Christian Council supplies the cash necessary for the perishables. Food should be brought in by Dec. 21.

Envelopes for 1972 - will be ready on Sunday, Dec. 19 and will be on tables in Friendship Hall. Remember, we urge you to turn in all 1971 envelopes by year's end, and only to those using 1971 envelopes will new sets be issued. So, if you've not used your set this year, now is the time to get caught up. Others desiring sets should make application for same directly to Pastor Rasche.

This meeting gives the vote to all members 18 yrs.and older, so come and use your privilege plus helping in the business affairs of your church.



#### 10 YEAR'S ACCOUNTING

With the month of December, the pastor completes ten full years of service here in Baltimore at our United Evangelical Church. These have been years filled with the bus iness of the church, both local, citywide and denominational, during which the Pastor was active, on the average, five and a half days per week, save vacation days, from 9 a.m until 9 p.m., serving a 12 hr. day in the majority of weeks. He has sought to maintain very regular office hours each day, during which many hours were spent in family and individual counselling with folk of the church and community on a large number of confidential matters. In addition to taking care

of the myraid of adminstrative matters pertaining to the church life as well as preparing for the services of the Lord's Day each Sunday, the Pastor has faithfully made constant calls upon the many sick and shut-ins of the church and community, plus calls of need into homes.

During this decade of service the Pastor has officiated at 476 baptisms, the majority of which required a parental consultation of at least ½ hour, covering a span of 31 eight hour days of time. 538 wed dings were conducted, each requiring at least 1 hour of pre-marital consultation, covering a total of 67 eight hour days of time. 603 funeral services were conducted, each of these being given importance by a call to either the home or funeral parlor prior to the actual service. 500 new members were received into fellowship with the church, either being of Confirmation age or adults.

The record of attendance at the services of worship the nine winter and spring months of each year is interesting. During the early 60's the average was above the 400 mark. Since '67, the figure has been in the high 300's, and the average attendance for the ten years stands

This is the record of the Pastor's activities during these ten years. It is not given in any spir it of self-praise, but is an honest and factual representation of what the records show. For the successes in the life of the congregation the Pastor expresses appreciation again for the many who have toiled long and hard out of their love for the church. If we have achieved anything together it is because the Lord has blessed us. May we continue to praise Hime and serve Him faithfully as Pastor and people.
