



NEW YEAR'S BELLS AND OTHER BELLS

We are accustomed to the ringing of bells at the stroke of the new year. Our hymnal has a lovely hymn entitled, 'Ring Out, Wild Bells To The Wild Sky,' with words by Alfred Lord Tennyson. The first stanza is as follows:

> Ring out, wild bells, to the wild sky, the flying cloud, the frosty light; The year is dying in the night

Ring out, wild bells and let

it die.

Ring out the old, ring in the new, Ring, happy bells, across the snow;

The year is going, let him go; Ring out the false, ring in the true.

Have you ever considered the place of bells in the life of man. In 'The Story of Our Hymns,' by Armin Haeussler, a study of the hymns in our hymnal, he gives a most enlightening account of bells in mans life. He reports that there was a time when bells were used to call people to gatherings of all kinds and to remind them of certain events:

Peasants and farmers had seeding and harvest bells, depend ing on the time of year;

American farms inevitably dinner bells, to call workers from the fields;

In feudal times an oven bell announced that the lord of the manor's oven was ready for tenants to bake their bread:

In schools, classes were begun and ended with the ringing of bells, as well as the opening

of the school day;

We all remember the old fire bells which preceded the siren and the bells on the fire engines, preceding the horns. Formerly, church bells were rung for many purposes - toll ed the number of years of age at a member's funeral; the Gabriel bell in England which rang at dawn on Sunday to wake up the parish; the pudding bell, sounded when services were about over to inform the servant to put the potatoes or pudding on, for the family would be home; not to mention the sounding of the bell(chimes for us) three times during the Lord's Prayer to signify Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

With bells so much an art of our history, it is hardly New Year's without the sounding of the bell, or the making of noise to herald in the new year. May this new year of 1972 be for us the development of the 'true' for us; the sluffing

away of the 'false.'





JANUARY SUNDAYS
