OUR 1972 CONFIRMATION CLASS

1. Lenten Sales. Again this series of sales was most successful in terms of profit and people involved It was a happy group of people who met each Thursday and Friday during Lent to prepare and offer for sale the various items. The report indicates that in excess of \$2300 was realized as profit, of which in excess of \$1500.00 was turned over to

the church by the Women's Guild.
2. Midweek Services. These services were varied in nature this year and the comments of favor of this arrangement were encouraging. Each service brought a different approach to the matter of Suffering, as expressed in the life of our Lord; in art, music, motion picture and in drama plus the spoken word. Highlights were the presentation by folk of the Peabody Conservatory on the one stormy and wintry night and the concert by the Salvation Army Band. The Lord's Supper drama during Holy Week saw an attendance which we could not handle and from which people were actually turned

away for lack of seating space. The solemn events of Tenebrae and the communion services were inspira tional for the many who attended.

3. Memorials and Easter lilies Again our folk responded to the invitation to place memorials with the church at Easter in a most en-These gifts heartening manner. made a large Memorial brochure neccessary and provided better than 60 lilies and Easter flowers about the altar and sanctuary for the Eas

ter service. We do thank you all.
4. Lenten Dime folders. This is always an example of extra giving to the church during the Lenten sea son, for which the church is grateful.
