100TH ANNIVERSARY YEAR BEGINS

Hail the long-awaited year, the year of the centennial of our beloved congregation. 1973 marks the year and September of 1973 marks the actual month of anniversary, but the event will be celebrated in various ways all year. Note the new masthead of our paper, for instance Each month or so the Anniversary Committee will keep you posted by articles in the church paper. Many things are planned for your concern and participation, so be on the lookout for announcements of developing plans.

The broad outline for September gives us three or four Sundays of special significance. The 2nd Sunday of the month brings our Annivary Communion; Then the 3rd. 4th

The second of these Sundays celebrates the present, and is designated as the official anniversary Sunday. The third of these Sundays points us to the future of the congregation and brings us the challenge for the second century of our congregational life.

We beseech you to be in prayer through this centennial year for the continued manifestation of Gods grace through our congregation. KEY 73 BEGINS ON NOTE OF PRAYER

The year of emphasis on evangelism which is being programmed by over 110 denominations and groups of churches is entitled "Key 73," meaning that the keynote for 73 will be the winning of others to Christ, which is known as evangelism.

Your United Church is cooperating with the majority of churches in Canton and Highlandtown in a unified program of action in this regard. Committees made up of representatives of these churches are at work on the various Phases of this unified effort.

Phase I is the preparatory phase and concerns itself with the attitude of prayer and preparation for the outpouring of the Spirit on our efforts in the coming months. Immediately after Christmas and into the first days of the new year we shall be in prayer each day at the hour of noon to 12:20, with prayer services in selected churches each Wed and Fri. of this period which ends Jan. 6th. On the night of Sat. Jan. 6th, a nationwide TV show will herald the beginning of the Key 73 emphasis. Then, on Sun. Jan 7th, in each congregation, Launch Sunday will be celebrated. In the evening of that day, Jan. 7, a Mass Rally will be held at Abbott Memorial Presbyterian Church, Bank and High-

land Ave at 7:30 p.m., A Mass Rally at which all folk of all churches are urged to be in attendance. At this Rally the new motion picture "A New Wind is Blowing" will be shown and festivities of beginning Key 73 will transpire.

ter and highlight the study of Gods

munity-wide. Then, after Easter,
Phase III will bring to us a commun
ity evangelism survey, seeking to
involve the unchurched in the program of God's Cause by personal com
