APRIL BRINGS PALM SUNDAY HOLY WEEK AND EASTER

With April the season of Lent gresses to its culmination in Holy Week and Good Friday, to be followed by a glorious Easter.

The early Sundays in April bring further Lenten messages and the Lenten liturgy at both the 8:00 and 10:15 a.m. services. There will be no communion services the 1st Sunday in April because of the closeness of Holy Week and Easter.

Each Wednesday we shall gather for the informal Lenten meditation periods at 8 p.m.; wherein much time is spent in singing the favorite hymns of the congregation and in meditation upon the theme: "The Cross and Men." A fellowship period follows each Wednesday service and at the same time a Bake Sale is held, sponsored by one of the organ izations.

Palm Sunday, April 15, is a meaningful day. It is the day we receive the palm branches, as we begin another Holy Week. These branch es will be distributed at both the 8:00 and 10:00 a.m. service (note the change of time) The Pałm Sunday message will be a part of each service and the Service of Confirmation highlights the 10 a.m. service Then, with Holy Week, the fine experiences at 8 p.m. on Wednesday and Thursday evenings are offered us. On Wednesday we again present "The Lord's Supper" in dramatic form, by our men. On Thursday evening the Tenebrae Service highlights the closing events in Jesus' earthly life. On Good Friday morning at 9 a.m. the service will provide the Good Friday message by Pastor Rasche. The service on Thursday evening and on Friday morning will include the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

From 12 noon to 3 p.m. on Good Friday the 3 hr. Good Friday community service will be held at St. Paul Luth. Church, Clinton and Pratt, sponsored by all the church es of Canton-Highlandtown. There will be no service at United on Good Friday evening. For a calendar of all these services, please consult the Lenten announcement provided you with the March Endeavor.





EASTER IS FOR Everybody

All Christians should go to church on Easter. All the folk of United should be at either the 6a.m or 10 a.m. service, even though you receive the Sacrament during Holy Week. For these services only, the Sacrament will be offered at the conclusion of the service.

Both services will be the same, with the beautiful Easter lily altar, the beautiful music of Easter by the choir, the liturgy for Easter and the Easter message by the Pastor. The traditional Memorial service for Easter will be included in the 10 a.m. service as will the first communion for the 1973 Confirmation class.

PLANS FOR Home for aged

One of the needs of our United ' Churches of Christ in the Baltimore area has been a Home for the Aged. For years that has been a dream, and now it has the possibility of being realized.

Through the graciousness of a family of one of our churches, a plot of about 11 acres has been made available to our churches to use as a site for such an institution. Tentative plans for a facility containing 190 units (1 bedroom apartments and efficiency apa ments) have been drawn up. Applications for funds for construction have been placed with H.U.D. of the Federal government. The location will be in the vicinity of Franklin Square Hospital. As plans progress more detailed information will be forthcoming.

CONFIRMATION CLASS

The class of 15 young people is in the final weeks of the 2 yr.Confirmation instruction. These 10 young women and 5 young men will be presented to their family members and the members of the Church Council on Thursday, April 5 at 7:30 in the sanctuary in an informal gather ing in which each Confirmand will present an original essay on a top ic assigned them. The Confirmation picture will be taken that same evening.

The group will appear for Confirmation at the 10 a.m. service on Palm Sunday, during which they will be accepted into membership with the church. And then, to climax the experience together as a class, the group will receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion for the first time at the 10 a.m. Easter service.
