The two books of the Centennial have been delivered into the homes of our active roster - the Program

and the Historical Book. Both of these present the picture of our celebration - the programs for the month, with the well-wishes of the friends and members in the 'ads,' and the story of our church at work in the past, at the present and geared for continued work in the fu ture. With the delivery of these two books to you and the beginning of our festivities, Phase I of our celebration is complete and Phase II gets under way. This consists of the anniversary itself and our part icipation in the same through our attendance plus our additional in-volvement through the bestowal of our special 100th Anniversary Love Gift and the return of our 25¢ Anniversary folder to the church. Further, for those who desire, the 100 Club will be open through the remainder of the year, for the Centennial really continues through Decem ber 1973.



CENTENNIAL NOTES

Begging your pardon for being repetitive, since this material appears in the Program Book, let us review the part of the Centennial already history and reiterate the good things still in store for us in

September and in the coming months. Earlier in the year our women had a grand Centennial meeting for all the women of the church. Rev. and Mrs. Yamamoto of Japan were present and brought a most interest ing insight into the Japanese church through lecture and slides. In June the Church School held the Centennial Fun Fair, providing an excellent evening of fun and fellow ship. In July the women had their Crab Cake Supper. And then in August our youth presented "Dem Good Ole Days," an original musical which provided much laughter and hilarity, as well as enjoyment of the roast beef dinner included in

the ticket price.
Yet to come in Sept.are the three major Centennial services at 10 a.m on Sundays, Sept. 16,23, and 30th. We began our Centennial celebration with the Communion services on the 9th of September. Sunday, Sept. 16 is our "looking at the past" Sunday on which we celebrate the reunion of our Confirmands of past years and welcome to the pulpit the Dr. Ernst Press, of Evansville, Ind. a Student pastor here in the 30's. On Sunday, Sept. 23 we observe our Centennial Sunday, and announce with honor that our guest speaker will be Dr. Paul Lehmann, Professor at Union Theological Seminary, a most noted theologian of our day. And on Sunday, Sept. 30 we "look to the future" and highlight the youth of the church. The guest speaker will be the Rev. Edwin Werner, a former assistant pastor here. Álso at this service, youth of the church will present the chancel drama, "The Challenge of the Cross."

After each of these services, worshippers are urged to participate in the "Centennial Coffee Hour" in Friendship Hall and view the many interesting mementoes which have been gathered for the occasion from friends and members and are on dis-

play for the month.

Week-day events of September are three in number. A Mardi Gras fun night is planned for Friday, Sept. 14, at which time many opportunities for fellowship will be provided, including some square-dancing. On Friday, Sept. 21, the Community Night celebration will be center ed in Friendship Hall. Invitations to neighboring pastors and UCC pastors have been delivered, as have invites to important people of the community and city. It is hoped that on this occasion, as for all other events, our own people will be here, but especially on this night, to play host to our guests

and to laugh and have fun when the old-time pictures of individuals, church and community events are thrown on the screen. This will be a real night of celebration.

Finally, on Sat. Sept. 29, at The East Wind, the Centennial Banquet and Dance will get under way at 6 p.m. with a Fellowship Hour. At the hour of 7 we will enjoy the ban-quet, followed at 8 p.m. with the evening program, at which time Dr. Ralph Weisser, our former Pastor of Visitation will be the speaker, Dan

cing will begin at 9 p.m.

In the months following September other Anniversary events are planned, including a Halloween party in October, a special event in November, and the Tinsel Day in December. Thus, from January through December we will have celebrated our 100th year old birthday, and 1974 dawns, enter into the seccentury of serving God and man down here in Canton.




