"everybody does it."

Is our sense of right and wrong to be based upon principles of the faith or upon a sliding scale of values, dependent upon what "everybody does." Is morality a relative

thing?

We, as the inheritors of the Christian faith, and upon which bas is our very life is to be geared, ought to always remember that there are no 'gray' areas between the white of righteousness & the black of unrighteousness. There are no areas in which something is more right than something else. Sin is sin, evil is evil, and wrong standards of practise can never be made right. Though gambling is now legalized through the Lottery still does not make it ethically right.

Of course, there are none of us who are 'lily white,' as the Word says. We are all sinners. We all need to constantly repent of the manners in which we have failed our Lord in our living.

But on the other hand we dare not permit ourselves to adopt the premise that our morality is a relative thing, that we can go the way of the crowd, because "everybody does it." The Christian faith makes us different from others in the expression of our morality. We seek to observe not only the Ten Commandments but these Commandments as augmented by the principles of our Christian faith.

It is time that our nation looks carefully at its morality and makes some mending tactics, for we are a Christian nation. It is also imperative that we,as Christian individuals, look at our own life and take mending action where and when necessary. Morality is not relative.
