ENVELOPE GIVING TO YOUR CHURCH

The 1974 sets of envelopes will be ready for you to pick up early in Dec., from the tables in Friendship Hall.

This announcement merits several reflections and rules of procedure. The last item first - please remem-ber that only those who have made contributions through their set of envelopes in 1973 will automatically receive 1974 sets. If you find no set made out to you, it probably means you did not make a contribution in 1973 through your numbered envelopes.

The second reflection is most im portant also. Recently the pastor went through the record of individu al members and wrote notes of encou ragement to those who have been neg ligent in attendance and communions beseeching them to make real their association with United Church by fulfilling the promises to God to come to worship and the Sacrament which they made upon entering membership through Confirmation or adult membership. Whilë thus perus-ing the records, the Pastor was astounded to discover how very many have not current envelopes nor have carried them in recent years. For some who are aged and perhaps without income this is understandable. The Church is ready to maintain such folk in active merbership thru out their remaining years. But others there are who are able, active, earning money and yet who have such little concern for this church they regard as their church that they do not even have envelope sets. By maintaining a set of envelopes is the only way credit can be given for our giving.

It seems to the Pastor that scores of people on our books need to carefully study their associa-tion with Christ and His Church (for us United Church) and to make application to the Pastor for enve-lopes, and with 1974, come again into active membership through at-tendance at worship, at the Holy Sacrament and by making contribu-tions through a set of envelopes is sued in your individual name.
