We are all very much aware of the energy crunch in our day, and, because of the repercussions of this crunch are being reminded to be conserving in many other areas of life. Because we have not been aware of the need to conserve, feel ing that our supplies were unlimited, we now are brought up short with this crisis. In like manner, there is a time crunch. Our time on earth is not un limited, even though some live as though it were. So many precise years, days, hours and minutes can be calculated, after our passing, as the span of time in which we lived. Also, one with superior wisdom and possessing the story of our life, could calculate the worth of our life.

We can, each one, do this much better, for we are living our life. We know the schedules of our time. Are we conserving the time given us to live, never knowing how long it will be? The beginning of another year of life, by the grace of God, is a good time to reflect and to make amends, if we have been wasteful.

How can we so regulate our time

as to conserve it in the best manner? I would suggest we priortize the use of our time(outside the hours we must spend at our jobs.) To priortize that which is spare time one would make a list of all activities that are or ought to be of concern and then to relist these according to the manner in which each activity assists in making the use of time an expenditure of worth.

Certainly the time spent with one's family is important. No one should ever be too busy to spend time with family members, not just being in their presence but doing something together which will give recreation in the best sense, the constant re-creating of the kind of rapport between parents and children or between man and wife which heightens the sense of love, devotion and companionship.

Then again, time should be given to God and His Church. Neither God nor the church should get the tailend of our time, after every other need has been cared for. One's faith is of sufficient importance that it needs to be expressed in additional ways than being in church on Sunday. The work of our Lord calls you to give your religious work a priority in the use of your time. The church cannot function without the giving of time by its members to expedite its furtherance

Yet again, an avocation, or hobby is important to the best use of time. Hobbies are as varied as people. Some have one, others have a number of activities. By way of example, as little spare time as we have at the parsonage, we still seek to follow hobbies to keep life interesting and productive. Mrs. Rasche collects old pressed glass, figurines and dishware. I have sought to work with plants in a win ter garden under light in the basement and in collecting old furniture

and antique clocks which I then refinish in my workshop and put into working condition. We have secured these materials from friends, and from auctions we have attended. We have sought to have multiple hobbies so as to have many activities to keep us from wasting time.

May we be aware of the crunch of time. It moves on relentlessly and we cannot recapture the time we have wasted. The sand in the hourglass keeps flowing. The use of time in the furtherance of the family, in the furtherance of our life of faith and in the pursuit of hobbies gives a zest to life which then is transferred to our daily work, enlivening it and making all of life worthwhile.
