A YEAR ON EVANGELISM

Evangelism is the process of telling the story of Jesus Christ and His glory, the story of redemption of sins and the gift of eternity with God through the blessed Lord Jesus. Evangelism is the personalizing of Jesus' commandment, 'Go, tell the story and baptize men into the faith.' Evangelism is gathering folk together in the Church of the Lord Jesus to enable l to maintain the faith and live

This story is not being heard as it should these days by our mod ern civilization. The call of the Christ is not getting through. As a result we read that only 4 out of 10 in our nation are in active relation with a church. As a result we see the terrible conditions of ungodliness of various natures which are being evidenced in our nation & world. Christ is still the answer to the needs of people and a generation. The redemption He offers is still the remedy to the hold of sin on folk & ways of living in our day.

Thus it is imperative we give at tention to Evangelism in the church We have slighted this for too long We propose therefore to do something about it in 1974 in a number of ways, making Evangelism the

theme of the year.

We begin this emphasis in Febru ary, with a series of what is hoped will be thought-provoking and response - eliciting messages on "The Biblical Anatomy of Evangelism." It will be our purpose to look at this challenge as presented in God's Word and through these messages to prepare ourselves for action in 1974.

Then, in the Lenten mid-week services, we want to direct our at tention to the questions of our faith, the examination of the basis of our faith as presented thru the Evangelical Catechism. Questions on the faith from congregational folk will be the basis of meditations at these very informal services each Wednesday at 8.

Also, during Lent, it will be our purpose to invite folk to be willing to witness and to accept the responsibility of making personal calls on specific folk of our larger fellowship, friendly concerned calls.

If possible (this is only tentative) after Easter we plan a week of evangelistic services with a guest speaker present to lead us in our thinking and convictions.

During these intervening months it will be our purpose to zone our congregation and set up a large series of fellowship meetings for community members in the various sections of our city, so we as fellow members can get to know each other better. These meetings will be in the fall of the year. The Pastor and one or more Council members will seek to be at each of these meetings.





FEBRUARY SERMONS TO INAUGURATE YEAR'S THEME

During February Sundays the pul pit messages will be on the theme of Evangelism, presenting 4 facets of "The Biblical Anatomy of Evangelism," or an explanation and the thrust of evangelism as reflected in the teachings of God's Word.

February also brings the pre-Lenten Sundays - Septuagesima, Sexigesima and Quinquagesima. Each of the February Sundays will highlight special features in addition to the messages.

REDISCOVER THE CATECHISM

This will be our purpose for the mid-week Lenten services in 1974, in reality to rediscover or give new strength to the faith of each of us. The Catechism is that question and answer compendium of the elements of our faith as has been used in Confirmation for many decades. Through the posing of questions that one may have about the faith and the answering of these questions by the Pastor in these services, and through open discussion, we hope to make the mid-week services very helpful to all.

To aid in this purpose, 100 copies of the Catechism have been placed in the pew racks, and cards upon which questions can be written have also been provided. We invite folk to peruse the Catechism, study it, and to jot down on a card(as many as you desire and as often as you desire) these testions. Hand them to an usher d the Pastor will receive them and use them to build the meditations for these services.

So, enter in upon this venture, rediscover the Catechism and help us to rediscover and strengthen our mutual faith in God through

Jesus Christ our Lord.
