1991

SUMMARY AND HIGHLIGHTS

1991 was an eventful year for the church and a year in which much was accomplished. Among the highlights were the

*achievement of substantial growth in membership and attendance - for the year we show consistent increases in attendance with the exception of April, October, and November. 28 new members were received during the year.

*119 visits were made to shut-ins and 151 visits to hospitals for a total of 270 visits. 40 funerals were performed, 18 baptisms and 13 weddings

*increased involvement in our joint ministry with neighboring churches and the creation of a banner for use of our church in public processions. These events have included, Blessing of the Palms with St. Brigid's, Holy Evangelists, & Messiah Lutheran, participation in a Vacation Bible School for eighty children and involving teachers from St. Brigid's, Messiah Lutheran, Canton Baptist, an Interfaith Music Festival involving twelve churches which was the largest interfaith meeting ever held in Canton-Highlandtown

*development of a community THINK TANK of five churches to provide coordination of programs and to share insights and ideas concerning the ministry and neighborhood need

*building of a more systematic approach to ministry to Shut-Ins through the establishment of a Parish Visitor Program involving 10 Visitors

*expansion of the Sour Beef Dinner in October by the inclusion of more men and more members of the church. This produced a record \$11,800 in income and at one time in the Dinner the involvement of over eighty persons in serving, cooking, carryouts, seating, ticket taking, etc.

*securing a computer to make our office more efficient

*completion of our first Church Directory

*establishment of a program of healing entitled "PRAYER AND HEALING IN THE NEW TESTAMENT" during the Lenten Services in 1991

*introduction of the "COMMUNITY FORUM" designed to help us to relate our faith to contemporary issues in the world

*establishment of a special Committee to examine the use of alcoholic beverages by our church and its members. As

a result, we are reviewing an issue which has been discussed by our members for about thirty years and have developed for review and study a "GUIDELINE FOR MEMBERS IN THE USE OF ALCOHOL" as a preliminary step to making a policy decision regarding the use of alcohol in our building

- *establishment of a Committee on Fund Raising to address the economic impact of the recession on fundraising for the church and to raise more money for the church. This resulted in the production of an AD BOOK for the Sour Beef Dinner, the sale of ENTERTAINMENT BOOKS, a special program to raise money for youth work in the church (entitled PENNIES FOR HEAVEN) and planning for a SPRING DINNER DANCE for 1992

- *reorganization, washing walls, and painting of the church office

- *the walls, pews, windows, and floors of the church were washed

- *building of the Youth Group, Youth Choir, and a new 1992 Confirmation Class of eight members and the recruitment of two new Sunday School teachers and three Youth Group Advisors

- *creation of the landscaping around the parsonage and the trees on Dillon and S. East Avenues through the use of barrels in which we planted bushes and flowers

- *developing a public interpretation of activities of the church and community in the Narthex so that we can all have a better idea of what is going on

- *continuing the Dance Class which not only brought hours of joy to participants but made possible securing new Christmas decorations for Friendship Hall and a program of installing ceiling fans in that room which are designed to save energy and to reduce the noise level in the summer

- *establishment of the SUPERPANTRY program designed to help single women heads of households and their children to get off welfare and to be a model for the state in helping those who are out of work in the depression

- *involving twelve neighborhood churches through the Interfaith Music Festival to raise approximately \$2000 to insure the continuation of this SUPERPANTRY program in 1992

- *we were able to get a front page story in the Guide on the graduation of people from the SUPERPANTRY. It took one year to do this

- *development of a brochure to provide a coordinated approach to emergency assistance for persons in Canton-Highlandtown

*a Gifts and Memorials book was completed and needs to be printed and distributed to our members

*a records retention schedule was completed and now needs to be made operational

*establishment of the NEW CREATIONS support group designed to help people who are dealing with "stuckness" to leave the past and continue their growth in finding a job, dealing with a family or marital problem, deal with job loss or problems with children, depression, and the like

*continuing growth of Scout and Cub Scout groups and the building of a Girl Scout Troop to augment Brownies

*development of the program of honoring those whose FAITH IS ALIVE by the presentation of a rose each Sunday - this program lifts up each individual member and points to Jesus teaching that each of us is the "light of the world"

*introduction of the UNITY CANDLE to recognize the unity of each member in our household of faith as our "mother, sister, and brother". While we celebrate anniversaries and marriages, we also rejoice in Jesus teaching that, if we do his will, regardless of the kind of family we have in this world, we all are members of a spiritual family, our household of faith, which will last forever.

*making our budget. This year we set out to make the 1991 budget which was 26% higher than that in 1990. We can rejoice that with the help of the Lord, we were not only able to do that but in the midst of this recession to exceed that goal by \$8,600.

EXPRESSIONS OF THE LIFE OF THE CONGREGATION

With the leadership of Marty Craig, our church installed a Yellow Ribbon on the pulpit to remember the men and women in the armed forces in the middle east and we now sing a hymn of remembrance for our county. At the return of the hostages we retired that Yellow Ribbon. It served as a symbol of hope for each of us during a difficult and trying time for our country.

Only those of us who have watched Jim Tallagsen and Sam Jones work on the building can appreciate the talented leadership job they have done for us in 1991. Their lives along with the men and women who have helped them have been dedicated in these past months to maintaining and improving the church building, solving major mechanical problems, saving the church money and making the parsonage a very wonderful place to live. Each of them takes great pride in our buildings and we know that each of them appreciates the work of the men and women who have assisted him in so many ways in these last

months. None of us can do these things alone.

Thanks to the Senior Choir whose loyal devotion has made possible the growth of the church, to those who played instruments, and who sang solos and duets during the year. Special thanks to Rob Gundlach, our organist and choir director whose artistic skill, creativity, and leadership made all this possible.

Thanks to the Children's Choir and to Lynn Sanders and those who have worked to make their performances in church so memorable for all of us.

Thanks to Carol Borkman, whose Child Care Program is so important to the life of our church and who, with her helpers, provides care while parents attend church.

Thanks to the Sunday School Teachers and to Carol Rowell and Ed Meyers who watch over a growing enterprise. They help to make real our "raising children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord."

Thanks to these women who are the backbone of the church in our three groups, the Sewing Group, the Guild and the Ladies Aide and special thanks to those members of the Altar Guild who work so diligently to see that the Altar is always prepared for Communion, Sunday Worship, and Special Events such as Tinsel Sunday.

Thanks to those who helped to collect food and organize and distribute Thanksgiving and Christmas Baskets to the poor. Our congregation thanks you and those who received the baskets will never forget your kindness.

Thanks to the Dance Group, the Bowling Group, and our Senior Citizen Group (Canton Friendship Circle) for financial contributions to the work of the church and for bringing so much joy to our people. You make United live for many, some of whom are not members of our particular the church.

Thanks to Ben Long and the Boy Scouts for their help in preparing food and for their help in so many activities of the church.

Thanks to the Council for the many hours of devoted service in formulating policy, giving attention to the financial details of our operations and planning and directing the future programs of United, providing such vital services as ushering and assisting in serving communion and in supporting the work of the Pastor.

Thanks to Millie Slechta for her devoted work as our Church Secretary and to Jim Slechta for seeing that the church is always clean and ready for us on Sunday. They did this while

overcoming personal adversity, personal illness, and the terrible motorcycle accident involving a beloved grandson. But on behalf of each of them, we express thanks to Grace Fader and Ruth Beckwith for assisting in the office during Millie's absence and to Jim Talagsen, Sam Jones, Art Jones, Henry Will, John Strong, Ben Long, and Wayne Shaeffer, and others who have pitched in during the emergency.

THE BOTTOM LINE

The Treasurer's Report is key to understanding the financial viability of our church and so the Pastor shall leave that to him. However, we all know something which dominates all that we do and is even more important than those results. Jesus said "where your treasure is, there is your heart also." So the future of our church will be determined by how faithful we are to the call of Christ. That is where our treasure is and the key to that call is the commitment of our people to proclaiming the gospel. If we are committed, we will be inviting new people to join the church and telling of the great things God has done for us personally and for the Church. If we do that the church will grow. If we are a happy committed people, new persons will want to be a part of the church because they will know that this church is where people love one another. The love which we share for one another and which the Pastor has found here, is our greatest and most valuable jewel. It exists because United is a family church rooted in faith. This is why we call ourselves, as did early Christians, "followers of the Way" - followers of a way of life and "children of God".

For his current work this past year, the Pastor, on behalf of the congregation expresses our thanks to Clarence Rowell, our President. It is a tough job to be a Council President in these difficult days of the church. We appreciate the steady and disciplined leadership he has given us for another year.

This report is a record of our ministry together as "followers of the Way". It is good that we understand the details of our work, the immense scope of our ministry and that we appreciate the involvement of so many person who have made it possible.

The Pastor has thought about what characterizes our church. He can only conclude that it is the great love which people show for one another. This is our greatest single strength. In spiritual terms he has attempted to symbolize this love in baptism when we raise up a baby and say these words from the first letter of Joh (I John 3:1).

TARGETS FOR 1992

In addition to maintaining our current program we need to focus on the following new targets.

* Building a sense of the church as a family. This is based on Jesus teaching that "whoever does the will of my Father in Heaven is my mother, sister, and brother." The Unity Candle is a key symbol to teaching this concept. This emphasis will meet the needs of the large number of widows, widowers, and single person heads of household in our congregation in addition to providing security for married couples. Through this program we will emphasize mutual support, sharing the good things that happen to people (as you would in a family), and the provision of mutual support in facing illness, hospitalization, death, and economic recession.

* Building a Young Adult Group to provide a support group for single mothers and young couples

* Continued strengthening of the spiritual life of our members through Bible Study, Prayer Group, and Community Forum (relating the faith to practical concerns), and a Support Group for our members and new persons called "New Creations".

* Resolving our conflicts regarding the use of alcohol through participation in discussions of this issue.

* install a ramp for disabled persons.

* Complete Installation of a computer to improve our efficiency and our capacity to do more work in less time.

* Exploring the possibility of becoming a teaching center for seminary candidates interested in the Urban Ministry.

* Continuing to strengthen our funding of the operating budget by adding a "Dinner Dance" in the Spring of 1992 and a capital budget program for replacement of plant and equipment.

* Building the visibility of United in the community so as to attract new persons to the membership, to work cooperatively with other churches in joint ministry so as to make our mission dollars go further, and to continue to relate to those of any denomination who can contribute to the support of the larger Church in this community.
