**PASTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT**  
**ROBERT M. ARMSTRONG, PASTOR**  
**1992**

**SUMMARY AND HIGHLIGHTS**

1992 was an eventful year for the church and a year in which much was accomplished. Among the highlights were the

\*achievement of substantial growth in attendance -for the year we show by month consistent increases in attendance with the exception of January, May, June, July, September, and December.

\*73 visits were made to shut-ins and 109 visits to hospitals for a total of 182 visits. 31 funerals were performed, 13 baptisms and 9 weddings

\*increased involvement in our joint ministry with neighboring churches and the creation of a banner for use of our church in public processions thanks to the hard work of Carolyn Noteware. These events have included, Blessing of the Palms with St. Brigid's, Holy Evangelists, & Messiah Lutheran, St. Casimir's, a Good Friday procession of the Cross led by St. Brigid's in which we carried a cross and prayed for each church and remembered again the sacrifice on the cross of our Lord Jesus, participation in a Vacation Bible School for eighty children and involving teachers from St. Brigid's, Messiah Lutheran, Canton Baptist, a meeting and worship service involving 300 persons and ten churches to protest violence on August 9th at the Waterfront Park, and an Interfaith Music Festival involving ten churches from Canton-Highlandtown, on December 6th, and our second day of Christmas Caroling through the neighborhood. The latter was led by Father Poetzel of Sacred Heart and included singing Christmas carols for me and Priscilla at the Parsonage.

\*development of a community THINK TANK of five churches to provide coordination of programs and to share insights and ideas concerning the ministry and neighborhood need

\*building of a more systematic approach to ministry to Shut-Ins through the establishment of a Parish Visitor Program involving 10 Visitors

\*Beginning a Jr. Council to involve young people in thinking about and contributing to leadership in the church.

\*expansion of the Sour Beef Dinner in October by the inclusion of more men and more members of the church. This produced a record \$12,609.65 in income thanks to the work of many people and particularly Grace Fader and Marty Craig. At one time in the Dinner we saw the involvement of over eighty persons in serving, cooking, carryouts, seating, ticket taking, etc. We served 1204 dinners and carryouts..

\*establishment of a special Committee to examine the use of alcoholic beverages by our church and its members. As a result, we reviewed this issue which has been discussed by our members for about thirty years and developed for review and study a "GUIDELINE FOR MEMBERS IN THE USE OF ALCOHOL". This issue was dropped during the year as one which we were not prepared to resolve because of its contentious nature. Therefore the policy for the use of alcohol in our building remains status quo. We do not permit it.

\*establishment of a Committee on Fund Raising to address the economic impact of the recession on fundraising for the church and to raise more money for the church. This resulted in our continuation of the production of an AD BOOK for the Sour Beef Dinner, the sale of ENTERTAINMENT BOOKS, a special program to raise money for youth work in the church (entitled PENNIES FOR HEAVEN) and exploration of a capital fund raising program using the sale of insurance policies to members. The insurance would be left to the church in the case of the death of a member. This project is still under study. Under Art Jones leadership the income from the AD BOOK for the Sauer Beef Dinner exceeded that last year.

\*building of the Youth Group, Youth Choir, and a new 1992 Confirmation Class of nine members and the recruitment of two new Youth Group Advisors. We need to re-evaluate the Youth Group but have been pleased with the development of a Youth Choir. The confirmation class has been expanded to include new students (a Jr. Confirmation Class) who will be involved in a two year program.

\* REMEMBER WHEN! was held on November 15th to honor the work of Fred Long and Otts Block. 50 persons attended this effort to honor these great leaders and to give thought to the development of Young Adult work in the life of our church. Rob prepared a slide show of 500 slides to give people a chance to look at the events of those years. Lynn Sanders chaired the planning group and Otts danced and Fred sang the old songs. Members of the old youth group had time to introduce their children to each other and to celebrate great years. It was a unique happy event. Let's bring back "Dollie"!

\*developing a public interpretation of activities of the church and community in the Narthex so that we can all have a better idea of what is going on.

\*continuing the Dance Class which not only brought hours of joy to participants but made possible securing new Christmas decorations for Friendship Hall and a program of installing ceiling fans in that room which are designed to save energy and to reduce the noise level in the summer.

\*continuation of the SUPERPANTRY program designed to help

single women heads of households and their children to get off welfare and to be a model for the state in helping those who are out of work in the depression.

\*involving twelve neighborhood churches through the Interfaith Music Festival to raise approximately \$2000 to insure the continuation of this SUPERPANTRY program in 1992. The program this year was held on December 6th at Sacred Heart. .

\*we were able to get a front page story in the Guide on the program to protest violence. This program also involved the Mayor, the Councilmen of the District, and ten of our neighborhood churches. Approximately 300 persons attended.

\*a Gifts and Memorials book was completed and needs to be printed and distributed to our members

\*a records retention schedule was completed and now needs to be made operational

\*establishment of the NEW CREATIONS support group designed to help people who are dealing with "stuckness" to leave the past and continue their growth in finding a job, dealing with a family or marital problem, deal with job loss or problems with children, depression, and the like was found to be of minimal help to members and dropped after a four month trial.

\*change in the leadership of the Scout and Cub Scout groups. Ben Long resigned as Scout Master after 11 years of outstanding leadership. He continues his leadership of the Troop Committee. The Girl Scout Troop lost its leader when she delivered her new baby.

\*development of the program of honoring those whose FAITH IS ALIVE by the presentation of a rose each Sunday - this program lifts up each individual member and points to Jesus teaching that each of us is the "light of the world"

\*the UNITY CANDLE continues to be used to recognize the unity of each member in our household of faith as our "mother, sister, and brother". While we celebrate anniversaries and marriages, we also rejoice in Jesus teaching that, if we do his will, regardless of the kind of family we have in this world, we all are members of a spiritual family, our household of faith, which will last forever.

\* during 1992, with the help of John Price and Harvey we were able to get a start on making the computer work for us in the financial administration of the church. This new development has been a major undertaking in the development of our church administration.

\*making our budget. This year we set out to make the 1992

budget which was higher than that in 1991. We can rejoice that with the help of the Lord, we were not only able to do that but in the midst of this recession to exceed that goal by over \$4,700. A great job was done by Harvey Jacob, our Financial Secretary, and Art Jones the Treasurer.

\*During December 1992, the Pastor had a triple-by-pass heart operation and was unable to function as Minister of the church. At the same time, Priscilla, his wife had major surgery in November 1992 and was unable to continue her work in the leadership in October, November, and December of the Bible Study and the Prayer Group. Members of the Council and Church picked up the burden of leadership and demonstrated again the spiritual strength and fortitude of our people even during a busy Christmas season. We have a "stout" church rooted in faith.

Marty Clement and Cathy Clement were invaluable members of the parsonage household in getting us through these surgeries. We can not express enough our thankfulness to them for the practical help during this period but also to each of you and the Council for you loyal and devoted support in our time of great need. You made "St. Batz'" live for all of us.

#### EXPRESSIONS OF THE LIFE OF THE CONGREGATION

With the help of Sam Jones, our Property Committee Chair, and the members of the church who generously donated to the cause we were able to install ceiling fans. In addition with the support of the ladies groups of the church and Sam's leadership we have made it possible for disabled persons of gain entrance to our church by installing our new ramp in the front of the church. .

Only those of us who have watched Sam Jones and the men of the church work on our buildings can appreciate the talented leadership job they have done for us in 1992. Their lives along with the men and women who have helped them have been dedicated in these past months to maintaining and improving the church building, solving major mechanical problems, saving the church money and making the parsonage a very wonderful place to live. Each of them takes great pride in our buildings and we know that each of them appreciates the work of the men and women who have assisted him in so many ways in these last months. None of us can do these things alone.

Thanks to the Senior Choir whose loyal devotion has made possible the growth of the church, to those who played instruments, and who played instruments, or sang solos and duets during the year. Special thanks to Rob Gundlach, our organist and choir director whose artistic skill, creativity, and leadership made all this possible.

Thanks to the Children's Choir and to Lynn Sanders and those

who have worked to make their performances in church so memorable for all of us.

Thanks also to the Youth Choir which developed this last year and to Lois Long, Scot Newvine, and Denise Fischer for their support and leadership during the year. They added new life to our worship services.

Thanks to Carol Borkman, whose Child Care Program is so important to the life of our church and who, with her helpers, provides care while parents attend church.

Thanks to the Sunday School Teachers and to Carol Rowell and Ed Meyers who watch over a growing enterprise. They help to make real our "raising children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord."

Thanks to Marty Clement and Priscilla Armstrong for their work in helping to deepen the spiritual life of our church by teaching Bible Study and Prayer. Special thanks to Priscilla for her leadership in the Lenten Series on Prayer and Healing and in her development of the Parish Visitor program this year.

Thanks to Paul Bauersfeld (St. Paul) for his devoted assistance not only in serving communion but in joining the Pastor in visiting the sick each Wednesday afternoon. Thanks also to Fred Long for his supports in parish visits and to Art Jones and Regina Long for helping serve communion.

Thanks to these women who are the backbone of the church in our three groups, the Sewing Group, the Guild and the Ladies Aid and special thanks to those members of the Altar Guild who work so diligently to see that the Altar is always prepared for Communion, Sunday Worship, and Special Events such as Tinsel Sunday.

Thanks to those who helped to collect food and organize and distribute Thanksgiving and Christmas Baskets to the poor. Our congregation thanks you and those who received the baskets will never forget your kindness.

Thanks to the Dance Group, the Bowling Group, and our Senior Citizen Group (Canton Friendship Circle) for financial contributions to the work of the church and for bringing so much joy to our people. You make United live for many, some of whom are not members of our particular church.

Thanks to Ben Long and the Boy Scouts for their help in preparing food and for their help in so many activities of the church.

Thanks to the Council for the many hours of devoted service in formulating policy, giving attention to the financial

details of our operations and planning and directing the future programs of United, providing such vital services as ushering and assisting in serving communion and in supporting the work of the Pastor.

Thanks to Millie Slechta for her devoted work as our Church Secretary and to Ben Long, our new maintenance man for seeing that the church is always clean and ready for us on Sunday. But on behalf of each of them, we express thanks to Grace Fader and Ruth Beckwith for assisting in the office during Millie's absence and to Jim Talagsen, Sam Jones, Art Jones, Henry Will, John Strong, Ben Long, and Wayne Shaeffer, and others who have pitched in during our emergencies. Our sincere thanks to Jim Slechta for his ten years of service to United as our maintenance man and our best wishes for health, happiness and joy in his retirement.

Thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Phil and Mary Thomas, our "Christmas Angels" whose gift will help make the purchase of a new computer for the office possible. This gift will make the work of our entire mission much easier and more effective. We extend to them our heartfelt thanks.

#### THE BOTTOM LINE

The Treasurer's Report is key to understanding the financial viability of our church and so the Pastor shall leave that to him. However, we all know something which dominates all that we do and is even more important than those results. Jesus said "where your treasure is, there is your heart also." So **the future of our church will be determined by how faithful we are to the call of Christ. That is where our treasure is and the key to that call is the commitment of our people to proclaiming the gospel. If we are committed, we will be inviting new people to join the church and telling of the great things God has done for us personally and for the Church. If we do that the church will grow. If we are a happy committed people, new persons will want to be a part of the church because they will know that this church is where people love one another. The love which we share for one another and which the Pastor has found here, is our greatest and most valuable jewel. It exists because United is a family church rooted in faith. This is why we call ourselves, as did early Christians, "followers of the Way" - followers of a way of life and "children of God".**

For his current work this past year, the Pastor, on behalf of the congregation expresses our thanks to Clarence Rowell, our President. It is a tough job to be a Council President in these difficult days, keeping a church going in the midst of a depression. We appreciate the steady and disciplined leadership he has given us for another year.

This report is a record of our ministry together as

"followers of the Way". It is good that we understand the details of our work, the immense scope of our ministry and that we appreciate the involvement of so many person who have made it possible.

The Pastor has thought about what characterizes our church. He can only conclude that it is the great love which people show for one another. This is our greatest single strength. In spiritual terms he has attempted to symbolize this love in baptism when we raise up a baby and say these words from the first letter of John (I John 3:1).

"See what love the father has given us, that we should be called the children of God, and that is what we are!"

That my friends is what we are called to be, "children of God" and it is our faith and calling to that "way of life" which will insure our survival as a people of God and expand our mission to the Canton-Highland community and to the world at large.
