LET US PRAY!

These are difficult times for many of us. **Illness, Job loss, and war, have turned our lives upside down.** During Lent we will be looking at how we might be able to deal more effectively with crisis. And how we might have access to a source of power we have not really looked at before. It was Jesus who gave us the power to achieve abundant life. As he said "Very truly I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do, and, in fact, will do greater works than these because I am going to the Father" John 14:12. Alas, few of us have even thought that through prayer we might have access to this infinite source of power. Though we have been members of the church for years, we have not learned how to pray nor have we taken prayer seriously.

As I visit people at home, in the hospital, and in my office, we usually close our meetings with the Lord's Prayer. That prayer is the model for all of us- The prayer our Lord Jesus taught us. If you want to pray, consider this masterpiece. You will notice that this prayer is not said in abject humility. It is a prayer of **command**, Listen to these commands. "Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in Heaven." Does God have us pray tentatively for survival and for food and drink? Certainly not. He teaches us to pray saying "Give us this day of daily bread." Does God have us pray tentatively for forgiveness or help in our times of trial. Certainly not! He teaches us to demand what we want by saying "and forgive us our trespasses, as we also have forgiven our trespassers. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from the Evil One."

If you think about this prayer as our model, you can feel comfortable in your prayers in asking God for things and in fact commanding them. We use amen to close our every prayer. Do you know what the word **Amen** means in the original languages? It means **"So Be It"**. God expects us as his children to carry ourselves with dignity in our relationships with him. God **expects us** to receive when we ask and to **"do the works that I do"** and even **"greater works"**.

Sometimes we do not seem to get what we ask for. This does not mean that God does not care. Some of God's **greatest gifts are unanswered prayers!** Or what seem to us to be unanswered prayers. Think about the commands in prayer which you have given to God. You can see, now, and in hindsight. That some of these, if granted, would have been disastrous.

During Lent we will be looking into Jesus' teaching about prayer and healing. Over one third of the Gospels deal with healing. **Come and join us in discovering the Amazing Grace and power which are his gifts to us all. Amen**

PEOPLE OF THE BOOK

The three great religions of the world, Christianity, Judaism and Islam all share the earliest of the Hebrew Scriptures, which we call the Old Testament. No other religions are so solidly based upon a Book as these three. Other religious groups have books of scripture, but they are not also a history of a People, as our Bible is.

Our Christian "Way" is based upon the scriptures, both Old and New Testaments. As People of the Book, we need to know something about our Book, the Holy Bible.

We need to know a little about how we received our Bible. For instance, did you know that the King James Version with which most of us were raised, is the first official translation of the scriptures from the original languages, Hebrew and Greek, into English? King James of England appointed a committee of scholars to do this translation, which they completed in 1611.

Before that time, in the 1500's the people who attempt to translate the Bible into the "common tongue," English, were tried and burned at the stake. Before the King James Version, the Bible could only be read in the Latin of St. Jerome, who translated the scriptures from Greek in the 4th century.

The translation which we use here at United is the New Revised Standard Version. The Revised Standard Version was completed in 1952, and was translated by a committee of scholars. The New Revised was completed in 1990. Both of these versions are the result of the work of many translators. These scholars had more ancient manuscripts to work with than the scholars of King James' time, so the translations we have today are more accurate than those earlier ones.

As our Bible study class reads the Bible together we learn not only what the passage says for today, but what it said to the people who first heard it, and a little about the history of the people who recorded it.

We are currently reading and studying the book of Exodus, the story of the Hebrew people's wandering in the desert before they are finally led to the Promised Land. This includes many instructions which Moses received on the Mountain, from God, concerning how to treat one another, how to have worship, and so forth. For example, in those far-off days, it was necessary to kill a lamb each morning and evening for a burnt offering to Jahweh. The blood had to be splashed around in a certain way, too. We are glad we no longer practice that worship style! But it had great meaning then, and it is good to understand that today, even though no longer kill animals for burning on an altar.

We meet Sunday at 9:00, in the back of the church, after the early service. We are always glad to welcome new members.


CANTON FRIENDSHIP CIRCLE


