

A BRIEF HISTORY OF HENRY SCHAEFFER, D.D. - INTERIM PASTOR

The Rev. Henry A. W. Schaeffer was for 16 years pastor of St. John's United Church Of Christ, Rolling Road and Wilkens Avenue and retired from there on January 31, 1981. However, he has been named Pastor Emeritus.

Of average height and solid build, with thinning gray hair, his brown eyes twinkling in a rather cherubic countenance, Pastor Schaeffer shows no symptoms of "pastoral burnout". Rather, his enthusiasm is that of a young intern.

Henry Schaeffer was born in Tamaqua, Pennsylvania on January 13, 1915, where he attended the Trinity Evangelical and Reformed Church and the local high school, from which he graduated in 1932. He then went to Ursinus College, Collegeville, Pennsylvania, graduating in 1936. Motivated by the earlier teachings of Dr. A. C. Thompson, his pastor in Tamaqua, he decided to enter the ministry and enrolled in the Lancaster Theological Seminary, graduating in 1939. In 1955, Ursinus conferred on him the degree of doctor of divinity.

He was ordained on June 29, 1939, in his home church, and began his ministry as pastor of the Manor-Brush Creek Charge in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania. He was called to Baltimore in 1944 and served as pastor of First and St. Stephen's Church for four years as well as supply pastor at First Church, Jacksonville, Md.

In 1948 he went back to Pennsylvania where he served for 14 years as pastor of Bethany Church in Bethlehem and from 1962 to 1964 as pastor of First Church in Sunbury, Pennsylvania. He became the 13th pastor of St. John's, Catonsville, on November 1, 1964. In those days the congregation worshipped in the White Mansion House on the 32 acre church grounds until the present church was built and dedicated on Pentecost Sunday, May 14, 1967; its centennial year. The original church was started by German immigrants in 1867 at Catherine and Lombard Streets.

Pastor Schaeffer was married on August 19, 1939 to the former Helene Schmauch, a native of Tamaqua and a graduate of Hood College. They have three daughters. He had one sister, Mrs. Kathryn Moyer, now deceased. The Schaeffers enjoy traveling and have been to Europe nine times. During the summer of 1980 they hosted two Alpine tours, with visits to the Passion Play at Oberammergau.

In addition to traveling, Pastor Schaeffer is also a stamp and coin collector and a photography buff. Musically inclined from youth, he enjoys singing and playing the organ and piano and hiking and swimming have helped to keep him in good physical condition.

Pastor Schaeffer has consented to be our Interim Pastor at least until the autumn of 1984 on a part time basis. Pastor Schaeffer can be reached through the Church Office and Mrs. Millie Slechta. His telephone number is 744-4977. Pastor Schaeffer will be conducting our Sunday and Lenten Services; teaching our Confirmands, performing baptisms, weddings and funerals and visiting our shut-ins and sick.

Pastor and Mrs. Schaeffer are personal friends of Rev. Paul A. and Mrs. Rasche.
