

## LADIES AID

## UNITED TRAVEL CLUB

This group had its first trip to the Passion Play in Oberammergau, Germany in July 1980, sponsored by the Lufthansa Air Lines with Mrs. Margaret Craig as director. We traveled to Munich, Germany and then to Switzerland, Austria and Vienna; then returned to Frankfurt, Germany and back to the United States. A two week tour. The highlights of the trip:

MUNICH - Visited the Town Hall Glockenspeil which rings daily at 11:00 a.m. to announce the arrival of lunchtime. We visited our first palace, the Mumphenburg Palace.

SWITZERLAND - Lake Constance - We drove on the Autobon at 80 to 100 miles an hour. Switzerland is the only country in Europe that does not observe daylight saving time.

3 Lucerne - Home of the Swiss Watch and Music boxes.

days Trip through the Swiss Alps - with lunch at Grindewald.

Boat ride on Lake Luzerne - Cable car ride to Mt. Pilatus - 7,000 foot up mountain.

AUSTRIA- Left Swiss Alps and stopped for a visit to Liechtenstein; then on to Saisbur-Crystal City of the world.

Lunch in the beautiful town of Innsbruck and visit to the site of the Winter Olympic Ski Jump. Left Austria via Schweinpass and passed through the village where "Silent Night" was written. Lunch at Berchtesgarden. Saw the ruins of Hitler's castle. Visited the area where the "Sound of Music" was filmed.

VIENNA - Visited the home of Mozart, many castles and concert halls. Arriving at Garnish was a new experience. We stayed in "Pensions". This is a large home that

has about 5 to 10 rooms with one bath per floor. The next day we drove to Oberammergau to view the Passion Play which is only given every 10 years. The play is 5 hours in length. It was in two sessions with a two hour break at noon. It is all in German but you have the English version in a booklet. It cannot be described in words. Back to Garnish for the night. Left in a.m. for Weisbaden, Germany.

GERMANY - We drove about seven hours to the Penta Hotel. The next day we took a 2½ hour cruise on the Rhine seeing many castles and vinelands and then shopping at Rudeshein and a wine tasting party where we received a certificate. Back to Weisbaden where a German friend of Mrs. Craig met us for dinner. Saturday morning we bid farewell to our tour escort "Heize" and "Petr" our bus driver, for our flight back to U.S.A. aboard a 747 Jet.

We all enjoyed a happy, healthy trip and hope we can travel together again in the near future.
