## CAMPS AND WORK CAMPS

**T**HERE is much in the world for Christian young people to do. With so much suspicion, mistrust, ill-will and bitterness in the world, there is great need for opportunities where young people, whose ways of thinking and acting differ, may gain a better understanding of one another, and learn by actually living and working together to exercise justice and fair play each toward the other.

The Church is offering these opportunities in its summer camp program. Here, by study, by play and wholesome association with other young people of similar age, under the guidance of Christian counsellors and teachers, foundations are laid for a Christian ethic that promises abundant fruitage in the after years.

Last year, 14,000 young people spent a week or more in 141 summer camps and conferences conducted under the sponsorship of the Department of Summer Camps and Conferences of the Board of Christian Education and Publication of the Evangelical and Reformed Church. This year it is estimated that a thousand more young people from our churches will register in 151 camps. In 1957, sixty-nine young people from our churches spent the greater part of the summer in Ecumenical Work Camps, sponsored by the World Council of Churches. Nine of these young people were located in Europe, three in Asia, and fifty-seven in the United States.

Through Work Camps, young people, differing in racial, cultural and religious backgrounds, eighteen years of age and over and usually with some college training, enter upon a project involving much hard, physical labor. In addition to the socially significant physical work, such as for instance building a church for refugees in Ried, Austria, a program of discussion and worship points up the responsibility of the group to the community, and of individual campers to one another. Work Campers volunteer their time, they share the living expenses of camp life and pay their own transportation costs whether it be to a point in the United States or to Europe, Asia or elsewhere.

One cannot measure the possibilities for developing Christian leadership offered by a well-conducted, church-sponsored camp. Work Camps, set up for the summer months in many parts of the world, have a tremendous potential for breaking down the barriers that so often separate people into hostile groups.
