

Anyway, cool, bracing weather makes people want to do things, and this is none the less true of church workers and churchgoers. In every department of our church the workers and the leaders will assume their places with zest and joy. This latter is of vital importance, for if there is no evidence of joy on our faces or in our speech and manner, why, we just cannot be benefited ourselves or benefit anyone else who looks to the church for comfort and hope.

And who has not had joy and blessings in attending church at the hour of worship? Church attendance fell off considerably during July and August, but a goodly number came to worship every Sunday, and some who live great distances from the church were there even on the warmest Sundays. Our choirs, too, are to be commended for having been on duty every Sunday all through the summer. But now with the return of autumn we look forward to the joy of seeing our whole church family together again at the place of worship.

REGIONAL CONFERENCE

On Wednesday and Thursday, October 14th and 15th, the Second Regional Conference of Baltimore and vicinity will convene in our church. This is a synodical as well as district affair, and we consider it an honor to be hosts to this Second Conference. We will entertain guests from all our churches in Baltimore, also from Richmond, Washington, Annapolis, Stemmers Run, Ardmore, Frostburg, Cambridge, and from Columbia, Pa.

There will be two days just filled with good things for everyone who is interested in Kingdom work. Good speakers from nearby and far away, and besides that there will be a fellowship that one does not want to miss if it is at all possible to be there. The day sessions begin at nine in the morning and the evening worship services begin at eight o'clock.

The registration fee is only \$2.00, and this nominal fee makes it possible for each organization to send more than one delegate. Visitors will be welcome at any of the sessions. However, they should notify the pastor if they wish to dine in the hall with the official delegation, so that the good ladies of our Aid Society who are going to serve the meals will know how many to prepare for. A charge of fifty cents per meal will be made to unofficial delegates. We sincerely hope that a large number of the members of United Church will attend the evening services on the Conference dates. Let us pray for the success of the 1931 Regional Conference.

Lodging Needed

As stated above, many of the Conference delegates will be out-of-town guests, therefore we must prepare to give lodging to about thirty persons. This should not be a difficult task for our congregation. We recall that four years ago, when Baltimore entertained the National Sunday School Convention, members of United opened their homes to 108 guests, giving them lodging and breakfast for nearly a week. This, then, should be an easy task for us: Lodging and breakfast for thirty persons for two nights. Kindly notify the pastor if you would like to entertain one or two of these good folks from out of town who are going to be with us on October 14th and 15th.


